The Land of the Living It is easy to believe that one will see the good things of the Lord in the land of the living, if he is in the prime of life with everything going well. But how many people are ever in such a condition and for how long? In the midst of all the suffering of this world, how can the Psalmist say, in the voice of every human being, “I believe that I will see the good things of the Lord in the land of the living”?

Well, what are the good things of the Lord? If they are peace, prosperity, health, and things of this sort, then they will be absent from the land of the living for very many people.

What could be more precious than this intimacy of shared suffering with the Lord? The [Second Reading](#) gives a different sense of the good things, though. The things people rejoice in are the good things, aren't they? The second reading recommends rejoicing when one shares in the sufferings of the Lord.

It is not so hard to see that there might be a reward in heaven for such shared suffering. But why would anyone suppose it is a good thing in the land of the living?

When the Lord suffered on the cross, those suffering with him were his closest companions. His mother was there, and so was his beloved disciple John. There is an intimacy in the union of shared suffering that is precious even as between human beings. What could be more precious than this intimacy of shared suffering with the Lord? In the Second Reading, Peter says that it is glorious.

This is a good thing that the wealthy of the world do not have a monopoly of. The Psalmist is right, then. Anyone can hope for the good things of the Lord in the land of the living.

Ascension of Our Lord

Imagine you are at the Ascension (Acts 1:1-11). How does it feel to watch Jesus leave?

It was probably difficult for the disciples to see Jesus go. Yet, if he stayed, they would not receive the promised baptism with the Holy Spirit. We must surrender our "treasures" to God before we can open ourselves to faith and trust.

Here is a meditation on letting go from "Nine Ways to Reach God" by Bridget Meehan, SSC, D.Min.:

If you see life and people as being on loan to you, you can see all as gifts. It is not good to cling tightly to relationships or to hoard earthly treasures. Revere all that you have with deep gratitude, and hold everything in open hands.

Reflect on the symbol of open hands. During your prayer time, open your hands and surrender all the important treasures and relationships of your life to God. Do you experience any obstacles in letting go and giving everyone and everything to God? Be aware of your feelings. Are you joyful? Anxious? Sad? Afraid? Share these feelings with God. Spend time expressing your gratitude to God for each gift and relationship.

What does the perspective of "all is on loan" say to you in your present relationships and in your present circumstances? Find concrete ways to express your love and gratitude to people you often take for granted, including Jesus.

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION Jesus said his apostles they would receive power when the Holy Spirit came upon them. They would be his witnesses unto the ends of the earth. On whom did the disciples depend for understanding of what that meant for them? Did they understand right away or did it take some time? On whom do we depend for any spiritual understanding?

God gave Christ "the fullness of the one who fills all things in every way." What is this fullness? What might be some "everyday" kinds of fullness? What kind of fullness would you like to have in your life?

"Behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age." Jesus said this after telling the eleven to make disciples of all nations. Discuss what Pope Francis said about that: He is with God the Father, where he always intercedes in our favor. Jesus is no longer in a definite place in the world as he was before the Ascension. He is now in the lordship of God, present in all space and time, next to each of us. In our life we are never alone: we have this Advocate who awaits us, who defends us.
