Shame and the Lord In the <u>Gospel</u> Reading, Jairus wades fearlessly into the crowd around Jesus and interrupts what Jesus is doing.

Jairus is an important person, an official of the synagogue; and his twelve-year old daughter is dangerously sick. He believes that Jesus could heal his daughter, but only if he comes right away. And so he urges Jesus to drop everything else and come *now*.

Jairus's interruption of Jesus is itself interrupted. Jesus stops dead and demands to know who touched him. Who touched you, his disciples say in disbelief! *Everybody* touched you! You are in the middle of a big crowd pressing all around you.

But, as we know, there *was* someone who touched Jesus in a special way. She was a woman who had had an issue of blood for twelve years, just as many years as Jairus had a daughter.

Under Mosaic law, that woman was unclean all those years. And anyone who touched her became unclean too. In fact, anyone who even touched anything she sat on or slept on became unclean. The woman had spent all her money on doctors to try to stop the issue of blood, but the doctors had only made her worse.

So she was poor, outcast, and scared of being noticed. Unlike Jairus, she didn't dare interrupt Jesus to press her own concerns on him. And now she had added this dreadful thing to all the other bad things about her: she had touched the Lord himself—and so, she must have thought, she had made even Jesus unclean.

No wonder she was trembling when Jesus called her out, and she had to face him. Shame such as hers makes a person desperate to be invisible.

Unlike Jairus, in *her* great need, she had not been willing to put herself forward. But she was so desperate to be healed that she was willing to be shamed, no-account, and invisible. She accepted being unnoticed as unimportant as long as she could be healed.

But Jesus was not willing to tolerate her own estimation of herself. He made the official of the synagogue wait for *her*. "Daughter," Jesus says to her, "your faith has saved you."

In that one word, 'daughter,' Jesus healed her shame as well as her blood-flow. He showed her and all the crowd around her that she was to him what Jairus's daughter was to Jairus.

And so Jairus was not the only one who cared for his daughter on that day.

Faith and Your Children - Demilitarizing the Sunday Morning War Zone

Have you ever heard or said any of the following things?

"Why do parents bring children to Mass if the children can't behave? The child in front of me spent the whole time whining and fidgeting."

"That's it, Joe. From now on we leave the kids at home and go to different Masses. I've had it!" "Jimmy, how many times do I have to tell you, don't bring your trucks to Mass! You're supposed to pay attention."

Let's face it, Mass is not an easy activity for most children. Little ones can get restless and older ones can get bored. Yet, as Catholic parents, we cling to a dream of gazing proudly down the pew at our angelic family rapt in prayer.

Can it happen? Probably not completely. Let's face it, the format of Mass is programmed for a mature faith; but a few "tricks of the trade" might help.

1. Read or tell the children stories from the Scriptures often, especially those passages that will be read at Mass.

2. Stop in at church for a "show and tell" visit. Talk about Jesus in the tabernacle and the vigil light that marks his presence. Kneel together for quiet prayer before you leave.

3. Purchase a Mass book for each child. For preschoolers, choose those with photographs so they can follow along visually.

4. When you arrive, encourage the children to make the Sign of the Cross with holy water to set a tone of sacredness.

5. Choose a pew near the sanctuary so they can see what is going on. It's hard to be holy while staring at the backs of heads.

6. Give younger children money for the collection (older ones should give on their own). Explain how the church uses their money. This will involve them in the ongoing parish ministry.

7. Take small children with you when you receive Communion.

8. Finally, continue your eucharistic celebration by stopping for coffee, juice, donuts, and discussion after Mass.

These ideas may help turn your Sunday morning war zone into the joyful celebration it was meant to be!

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION
