Grieving God In the <u>Second Reading</u>, Paul warns people not to grieve the Holy Spirit of God. It is a sad thing to grieve your mother or your best friend. It is really dreadful to grieve God himself. How does a person manage to do such a lamentable thing?

You grieve God when you engage in malice, Paul says. Now malice is the opposite of love. To love someone is to want the good for him and to want to be united with him, too. So you can be malicious by refusing either of these desires of love. If you want what is bad for another person, or if you utterly reject another person, you are malicious with regard to him.

If you are bitter, you are malicious; and when you are malicious, you are opposed to love.So you don't have to engage in murder or theft or adultery to grieve God. As the Second Reading implies, you can grieve God just by reviling another person. You revile a person when you say bad things about him, to his face or behind his back, just for the sake of putting him down. When you do this, you take a kind of perverse pleasure in his badness. That is why reviling is malicious. It is the opposite of love's desire for the good of the other.

Bitterness is on Paul's list of ways to grieve God, too. A bitter drink is one that has no sweetness in it; it just sets the drinker's teeth on edge. Your heart and mind are bitter if you are focused largely on the bad in things, and that bad-tempered focus of yours sets everybody else on edge as they try to tiptoe around you. You can't want the good for others if all you can see is the bad in them. And you can't want to be united with them either if your bitterness blocks joy in you.

If you revile others, if you are bitter, you are malicious; and when you are malicious, you are opposed to love. But God is love, and it isn't possible for there to be union between God and what is opposed to God.

Your malice grieves God, then, because he has lost you when you are malicious; and, for God, your loss is worth grieving.

It's a sobering thought to be so loved, isn't it?

Remembering Our Story: Evangelization in America During the 19th Century - <u>EMILY STIMPSON CHAPMAN</u> - Emily Stimpson Chapman tells of the triumphs and obstacles that Catholics faced in the 1800s when evangelizing. STRENGTHENED BY THIS FOOD. Vatican Council II sums it up in the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, no. 7. We believe without a doubt that Christ is present and living among us. We know of many ways when celebrating liturgy and, most especially, in doing Eucharist. This way – Eucharist and Communion – we love the most because it is so tangible. It seems personal at first. But ultimately it is always communal. We eat and drink one-by-one within the great crowd of believers coming in procession toward the altar, toward the meal, toward Christ. \cdot What do I believe about Eucharist and Communion? \cdot Why is it critical that I do this with other believers? \cdot How does this community of believers strengthen my faith and keep me faithful?

Praying the Magnificat of Mary

Read the Magnificat (Luke 1:46-55) and follow these suggestions for meditation. "And Mary said: 'My soul magnifies the Lord ... '"

Look at yourself through God's eyes. What wonderful qualities has God created in your soul that show how great God is: your kindness, your openness, and so forth.

"The Mighty One has done great things for me ... "

What great things has God done for you in the past week? Thank God for those things.

He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts ... "

Where do you make judgments? Who do you think is not as good as you? Ask God to disperse those arrogant thoughts by showing you in what ways those people are better than you.

"He has brought down the powerful from their thrones and lifted up the lowly."

In what situations do you have power -- at work, at home, in parish organizations? Whom do you have power over? Switch places with those people in your mind. Resolve to do something about that situation that will "lift up the lowly."

"He has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty ... " What are you rich in that others do without? Give some of those "good things" you treasure (not castoffs or something you don't want anymore) to someone who is hungry or poor.

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QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

God sent help to Elijah in the form of an angel. What kind of help do you think God would send today? Name some ways you can be the "hearth cake" for a person in a desperate condition.

Do you think you could get better at "being an imitator of God?" How? Is it more likely to happen all at once because you want it to, or a little at a time because you work at letting God into you? If you were going to work at this, where would you start? The crowd murmured when Jesus said he was the bread that came down from heaven. How did knowing his mother and father impact the crowd's willingness to believe him? Is it easy to accept a "prophet (one who speaks for God) in your own circle of acquaintances? Explain.
