What Do You Want? In the Gospel Reading, blind Bartimaeus will not stop yelling for Jesus to have pity on him, until Jesus finally calls for him.

And at this point the funny parts of the story start. Why doesn't Jesus go over to Bartimaeus? Why wait for the blind man to find his way to Jesus? And when Bartimaeus does find his way to him, Jesus asks him what seems like the dumbest question: "What do you want me to do for you?" What on earth would anybody suppose Bartimaeus wants? He's blind!

And when Jesus heals him and Bartimaeus can see, Jesus says that Bartimaeus's faith has saved him. But why? What does Bartimaeus's receiving his sight have to do his being saved?

Here we need to notice what Bartimaeus actually says to Jesus in answer to Jesus' question to him. Bartimaeus does not say to Jesus, "I want my sight." He says, "I want to see." To want sight is to want a capacity which can be used for all kinds of purposes—raising sheep, making money. But to want to see is to want the connection with reality that the exercise of sight makes possible. Wanting to see is wanting to know the true nature of reality, hidden in one way from a person when he is blind.

Once we see what Bartimaeus asks for, the funny parts of the story make more sense. When Jesus calls Bartimaeus to himself, he gives Bartimaeus a small period of time to consider what he really wants, before Jesus asks him. And then the presence of the Lord and that question serve as a call to Bartimaeus to commit himself to just one heart's-desire. And Bartimaeus finds it: I want to see.

Seeing isn't limited to seeing the blue of the sky or the road to home. It is also a matter of seeing the truth about things, or even of seeing The Truth himself.

And so Jesus gives Bartimaeus all that he asks for. Bartimaeus sees not only the world around him but also his Lord. And in seeing Jesus, Bartimaeus accepts the Giver together with the gift of sight. Although Jesus gives Bartimaeus the option of going off, Bartimaeus stays by Jesus and follows him.

Bartimaeus came to Jesus and he saw the Lord, because seeing was what he really wanted. And that's why Jesus tells him that his faith has saved him.

REAL SIGHT. Bartimaeus was blind and poor – but relentless. Even when shushed, he kept calling out to Jesus. He shed his cloak. He jumped up. He moved from blindness to sight, then, from sight to insight into Kingdom behavior. All because of Jesus' graceful mercy. When told to go on his own way, the former blind one followed Jesus the Illumined One on the way. For what do I cry out to Jesus? What will I shed, throw off in order to follow? What blinds me to walking the Christian life?

<u>VOCATION CORNER</u>— "There can be no promotion of vocations or Christian mission apart from constant contemplative prayer. The Christian life needs to be nourished by attentive listening to God's word and, above all, by the cultivation of a personal relationship with the Lord in Eucharistic adoration, the privileged "place" for our encounter with God...Mary Most Holy, the Mother of our Savior, had the courage to embrace this ideal, placing her youth and her enthusiasm in God's hands. Liturgy - "Word of the Lord ... ": Timeless God of Love

Janet was found dead a few weeks ago. She had killed herself. People who knew her were amazed. She was always so capable and so sensible. What went wrong?

Various facts came to light after her death. She never got over the loss of her child several years ago; her husband's drinking problem was worse than anyone knew; far from the confidence she projected, her experience was insecurity and loneliness. Janet tried to carry alone the burden of a broken heart. She did not want to appear weak or vulnerable.

In the readings at Mass we learn of God's love, the only source of eternal strength. This everlasting love is originally revealed in God's creation and in the Hebrew Scriptures history of the Chosen People. The Hebrew Scriptures are the story of God's steadfast love in covenant with God's people. God's love calls us to be weak and vulnerable, to find our strength in the divine.

The Hebrew Scripture reading, the first reading we hear, sets the stage for the gospel passage proclaimed by the deacon or priest. Christ came to complete the law and the prophets. Our Redeemer simplified the Old Covenant law by focusing on loving and being loved as the heart of God's purpose. Actually, it's not as simple as it sounds; loving can be a painful experience. Generous Christian love means being vulnerable and open to hurt.

Christ was vulnerable in love to the point of death. Death became life in the Resurrection; the eternal triumph of love was revealed. Whatever else may die, love lives forever.

Every time we keep on loving we are bringing eternal life to ourselves and those around us. Left to ourselves we cannot love like this. Through the power of Christ's love, revealed in the Scriptures and in the Eucharist, we gain strength enough to transform crucifixion into resurrection, death into life.

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OUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

Is there anyone in your life who needs the road "leveled out" just a little. Is there anyone you can ask, "What do you want me to do for you," as Jesus did in the today's Gospel? If you help, how is this good for both of you?

"He is able to deal patiently with the ignorant and erring, for he himself is beset by weakness." How would experiencing weakness help someone in ministering to others? Do you think Jesus' human experience and suffering draws people to him? "Master, I want to see." What is it that you want to "see" that will change your life as radically as Jesus changed that of Bartimaeus? What is the central miracle here, the blind trust or faith of Bartimaeus or the healing of physical blindness?
