**Winning and Losing** In the First Reading and also in the Gospel Reading, there is a prophecy about a time to come that will be very bad. The First Reading says that in that bad time God's people will escape the trouble. But Jesus says that in that bad time Christians will be hated in bad times? Do Christians lose and lose and lose, as the Gospel of Matthew says? Or do they win by escaping the trouble, as the First Reading says?

Escaping is managing not to be turned into a horror and a disgrace by your own cooperation with the evil all around you that masquerades as good.

But what is losing? Is it a matter of being hated, afflicted, and killed? Christ was hated, afflicted, and killed, too. And yet Christ did not lose on the cross, did he? He won.

And here we should notice that, in both the First Reading and the Gospel Reading, there are TWO endings of the story of a human life, not just one. There is the end of the story in this world, when Christ's true disciples will be hated and afflicted. And then there is the real and final end of the story, at the last judgment, where each person will see himself as he really is.

At that last chapter of each human story, the First Reading says, some people will be seen as the horror and disgrace that they really are. Others will shine like the splendor of the stars.

The winners in the battle of life, those who shine like stars, are those who have turned many to justice, the First Reading says. Acting with courage and integrity for justice, goodness, and truth can get a person hated, afflicted, and even killed, can't it?

And now we can see what it is to escape bad times. Escaping is not a matter of living at ease in prosperity, honored by the world around you. Escaping is managing not to be turned into a horror and a disgrace by your own cooperation with the evil all around you that masquerades as good.

This is an escape that God will give anyone who is willing to take up his cross daily.

And so the losing of the cross, the willingness to be hated and afflicted for the sake of justice—that is the way to the final winning where God's people shine with the splendor of the stars.

**VOCATION CORNER** This coming week we celebrate a National day of Thanksgiving. We, Catholics, give even greater thanks for all the gifts God has bestowed on us and for us to share. Each one of us has been given a unique calling to Holiness. Each one is to serve the Lord in her/his own "called" way. A vocational calling is asking us to surrender our talents to God so that they may be sanctified and produce fruit for the Kingdom.

**SCRIPTURE REFLECTION** Look at the trees. Unless a pine or live oak, most trees in the northern hemisphere have already dropped their leaves. Though looking dead, they are dormant only. We look ahead to spring and new leaves – and new life. But now is end-time living. Now is end-time praying. When my life passes away in death, I want to be with Jesus. What will I shed now for the benefit of later new life? What path does Jesus lay before me? How am I preparing for death?

## Liturgy - The Homily

Saint Paul, one of Christianity's greatest preachers, could not always hold his audience. Acts 20:7,9 recounts how once Paul "continued speaking until midnight ... . A young man named Eutychus, who was sitting in the window, began to sink off into a deep sleep while Paul talked still longer. Overcome by sleep, he fell to the ground three floors below."

All of us have experienced boring homilies, but hopefully we are patient. The proclamation of the gospel is the priest's primary duty, an awesome responsibility. As listeners we sometimes sit there anticipating a marvelous word or action that will turn our world upside down. We imagine a power in this homily that will sweep us off our feet so that life will never be the same again. The communication of the Good News, however, is a two-way street; we share the responsibility!

The door of every Jewish home is opened during the annual Passover celebration meal. The expectation is that one day the great prophet Elijah will return to herald good tidings for Israel. The eyes of the Jewish family are fixed on the open door, each one waiting for something to happen. Good preparation for the homily requires that we open the door of our heart and fix our eyes, not on the preacher, but on Jesus speaking through him.

If all our expectation is invested in the preacher, then we risk overlooking the one person able to change our lives forever. Christ does not barge in and take over. He comes, in his own words, "even as you listen." Jesus doesn't force his entry. He knocks persistently but gently until we open the door.

The liturgy, the Mass, and the homily in particular, may not always seem exciting. Our attitude is essential. We cannot afford to simply stand around waiting for things to happen. Be actively involved in listening to both the gospel and the homily; be hungry for Christ's vision and call. Our eagerness makes life new and exciting.

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### QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

Name some people who have led "many to justice" and are now "like stars forever." Since stars are at times used for navigation, how can people like Oscar Romero and Martin Luther King show us the way?

Jesus won redemption for us. Does he just hand it to us? What part do we have in it? Does God ask you for sacrifices? How can your sacrifices help anything?

"The Word of God will not pass away." What do you take along with you when you die? Is there any correlation between love and the Word of God that does not pass away? Is there anything you can do to stretch your capacity to love?
