Winning That was Then; This is Now In the Gospel Reading, Christ is being held by Pilate, who has him in his power. In the next part of the story, as we know, Christ is on the cross: poor, dishonored, in pain, and dying.

Christ's willingness to accept these afflictions sets the standard for all Christians, and it turns all worldly standards upside down. What most people reject as the worst things in life turns out in Christ's crucifixion to be the prize-winning goods. On the cross Christ makes manifest that real winning is what looks to the world like losing. And vice versa too, of course. There is something small and unworthy about a life lived totally at ease.

Which of these two pictures—of Christ, of Christ's people—should set the standard for us, the goal at which we aim?

That is why Paul says that all things work together for good for those who love God—all things (Rom. 8:28). Our sins are included in that "all things," not just our suffering. When Paul pleaded with God to take away right then a sin of Paul's that Paul was impatient with, God told him, "My grace is sufficient for you." (2 Cor.12:9)

But now notice in the Second Reading the very different picture of Christ and of the standard of excellence for Christ's people.

The Second Reading shows us Christ not as poor, dishonored, and suffering but as the king of kings, the most powerful and honored of all rulers. And it shows us, Christ's people, in the same way: not as afflicted with Christ-like suffering, but glorious in Christ's kingdom. In that picture, all Christ's people are honored priests for God, and they are also freed from their sin—not some of their sins, but all of them.

So which of these two pictures—of Christ, of Christ's people—should set the standard for us, the goal at which we aim?

The answer, of course, is "Both of them!"

There is a time for suffering, when all worldly values and all earthly desires are turned upside down, a time when we struggle with sin and suffering. But there is also a time when things turn right-side up again and then all struggle ends.

At that time, each one of Christ's people will say of every affliction, "That was then; this is now!" Only that now, when all sin and suffering falls away, is an everlasting now. And the cross is the way to it. Eleonore Stump

Liturgy - "We Believe" ... God's Promises Kept

The storm began after Beth had gone to bed. Awakened by a clap of thunder, the frightened child called for her mother. Mom advised that everything would be fine, God was in the room watching over her. Beth replied, "I know, but I want someone with skin on!"

God does watch over us. Because God doesn't exactly "have skin on," we don't always recognize the divine presence. In spite of all God's promises both made and kept, we still do not always believe. Maybe it's too good to be true. Rather than take God's word for it, we dare to wonder if there's a catch.

Every week at Mass we say the Creed. This prayer focuses our attention on the loving Creator, the redeeming Son, the energizing Spirit, and God's embracing family -- the Church. Every word and every sentence is both reminder and proof that our God in heaven is the faithful Author of all life and love.

On Easter, the paschal candle is one of the predominant symbols on that greatest of all feasts. This new fire recalls the day of our baptism, the day on which we received a personal candle as a keepsake and reminder that now Christ's light illumines our minds and hearts. Each of us shares the light of Christ and must carry that light into our world.

The Creed is an ancient prayer of the Church, dating to the Council of Nicaea in A.D. 325 and completed at the Council of Constantinople in 381. This prayer speaks only of God and not at all of ourselves. Thus we are drawn out of ourselves, impelled to give thanks and praise. Eucharist means "to give thanks."

Mass ends and we return to daily living, still the people "with skin on." Yet our life in faith, spoken in the Creed, has divine promise because "we look for the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come."

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QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

Compare and contrast Jesus' kingdom with countries that have powerful political organizations. List objectives of each. How would each define "service," "ransom," and "bloodshed"? Does the universe that Christ consecrates to God include areas of your life or world that previously you might have considered outside the realm of "holy"? Discuss. Can we understand truth differently at different times? Was there a time when we accepted slavery, and do we now question the death penalty? Should the Church mature in judgment as we grow in understanding the truth?
