Making Time and Space The Spirit descends on Jesus after he was baptized. It is the Spirit that anoints Jesus to "open the eyes of the blind, to bring out prisoners from confinement, and from the dungeon, those who live in darkness, and to bring to the poor the good news of salvation." This news is also "the good news of peace": The Spirit comes in the form of a dove.

There is a gentleness about the dove that has earned for this bird a universal association with peace. But the dove also has a wail that reminds one of the wail of someone suffering, as in poverty or childbirth. The dove, therefore, joins together the themes of justice and peace, of compassion for the poor as well as harmony among people.

Luke makes clear that the descent of the Spirit in the form of a dove takes place as Jesus was at prayer. In other words, Jesus was open to the action of the Spirit. There is certainly a message in that for us.

Peace and justice will enter our lives only if we are open to the action of the Spirit, if we make time and space for the voice from heaven to be heard within our hearts. If we make that time and space, then "the Lord will bless his people with peace."

In order that the demands of justice may be met and attempts to achieve this goal may succeed, what is needed is the gift of grace, a gift which comes from God. Grace, in cooperation with human freedom, constitutes that mysterious presence of God in history which is providence.

Liturgy Breaking of the Bread

Giving orders looks easy until we have to do the ordering. The person in charge quickly discovers that barking directions and shouting instructions do not always work. If people are not persuaded, there will be no response.

Jesus' awareness of this truth is evident in the Gospel of John: "Those who love me will keep my word Whoever does not love me does not keep my words" (John 14:23-24). Jesus does not command with empty words; he challenges us to love "as I have loved you." This makes all the difference.

In every Mass, after the sign of peace, there is the breaking of the bread, a reminder that Christ's own body was broken and suspended between heaven and earth in an act that changed forever the balance of power between God and the people.

During World War II, General Eisenhower visited front line troops, hoping to lift their sagging spirits. The day was wet and miserable as the general spoke from a makeshift platform. Sensing that his soldiers were respectful but unmoved, Eisenhower quit the speech. Moving to the edge of the platform, he began descending the muddy steps, only to slip and land face first in a puddle. Shrugging off the laughter, the commander said, "That fall did more for morale than any speech I could ever give."

On the platform, the general could not help but speak down to the servicemen. The mud on his face changed everything; he was one of them. Jesus looked down from the cross to become one with us. Jesus gave us everything, even a share in his own divine life and the eternal inheritance that it promises.

At the breaking of the bread, we recall the cost of redemption: "Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us ... grant us peace." All of us at times are called to work for peace in our homes, our neighborhoods, our world. To offer such gifts always requires that we sacrifice something of our own status. Often the price is being broken in both body and soul. But broken is not the end, for in giving, our spirits are raised and we are brought back to life, forever and ever.

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QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

In the alternative reading, God says, "here is my servant whom I uphold, my chosen one with whom I am pleased." Then in the Gospel a voice came from heaven, saying to Jesus, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." What are the implications?

Did we do anything to earn salvation? Why does God give it to us? What does St. Paul in his letter to Titus say about the extravagance of God's gift to us?

John the Baptist was the middleman. He pointed back to Isaiah and forward to Jesus, connecting the whole plan. What or who are the "middlemen or women" who connect you with God? Can you serve as a middle-one?
