The End of the Story In the Second Reading, Paul says that if Christ is not raised, your faith is in vain. This is a hard saying. Faith is meant to make a person fruitful, like a tree planted by running water, as the Psalm says. Why would a person not be fruitful if he thought there was no resurrection?

Well, the fruits of a life are the fruits of the indwelling Holy Spirit. Here are the first four: love, joy, peace, and patience. If God is indwelling within you, then he is present in love to you; and love, joy, and peace come from the presence of your Lord. It is easier to wait in patience through the afflictions of this life if God is with you, too.

And here we should notice that you can lose the fruits of the Spirit and become a fruitless person whose faith is in vain in different ways.

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The First Reading says that you will be like a dried up plant if you put your trust in the things of this world. You can lose your job or your health or your spouse, for example. And then if you trusted in the things of this world, you would become bitter because your career or your life or your relationships would have failed to be what you trusted they would be. You wouldn't be fruitful in love, joy, and peace in that condition.

But you can go wrong another way too. In the Gospel Reading, Jesus says that those who are hungry and weeping and hated are blessed. If you think there is no resurrection, you will think that being in so miserable a condition is the best you will ever have. And then you will certainly lack love, joy, peace, and patience. Then you will be both bitter and self-congratulatory in the mistaken view that you are spiritually advanced because you take denying yourself as a good in itself.

So for your faith to be fruitful, you do need to believe that there is a life after this one where there is no more hunger, weeping, or hatred. If you grasp that after the crucifixion of this life, there is the life of the resurrection when God himself will wipe all tears away, then and only then will you be fruitful in love, joy, peace, and patience.

Sixth Sunday of Year

Jeremiah 17:5-8; Psalm 1; 1 Corinthians 15:12,16-20; Luke 6:17,20-26

Today's readings teach us the real heart of true religion: God is our sole refuge. The prophet Jeremiah says that the just person is like a green tree because strength is found in the Lord.

The passage from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians states very clearly that if Christ is not risen from the dead then the apostolic preaching is meaningless and the Christian faith is fruitless. The Resurrection is the culmination of all salvation history and the ultimate victory over sin and death. The faithful will rise on the last day, joining in the eternal life that has been won by Christ.

Luke's version of the Sermon on the Mount (which he calls the Sermon on the Plain) has many similarities to Matthew's version (Matthew 5-7), but also many differences. Matthew has nine beatitudes and no woes, Luke has four of each. Luke compares the blessedness of the poor, the hungry, the weeping, and the persecuted to the sadness of the popular, the smug, the full, and the rich. "Woe" is Luke's way of describing what befalls those who fail to recognize God as sole source of true meaning and lasting joy.

Our growth in faith, from the moment of baptism to the moment of dying, is a discovery of the Lord at the center of all genuine meaning. How centered are we in the Lord?

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QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

Compare and contrast the tree planted beside the water with a barren bush. Do you identity completely with the tree or do you have some of the barren bush in you? Where does choice come into this picture?

Do you think every truth was present at the foundation of the Church or do you think some truths evolve with time and circumstances? How does the idea of resurrection impact your life now? What would your life be like now if you had no hope of resurrection?

Although it is inevitable that disciples suffer, such directives don't require you to be constantly poor or hungry. Simply realize your need for God, whatever your situation. These demand a choice. Is it a choice you can make once or do you have to make it repeatedly?
