Righteousness In the First Reading, God promised Abraham that his descendants would be innumerable, and Abraham trusted him and believed the promise. God counted that trust as an act of righteousness on Abraham's part.

Then God promised to give Abraham the land around him. In response, Abraham asked, "How am I to know that I will possess it?"

Trust in God came hard to Abraham. No sooner had he managed it, and gotten credit with God for it, then he lost it again.

If you were actually willing to honor my question, then you might try to allay my skepticism in some way. But here is what God did. He had Abraham sacrifice some animals, and then he sent Abraham a terrifying darkness and a vision of fire over the sacrifice. While Abraham was having that vision, God reiterated his promise to Abraham and developed it: God promised to give Abraham the land and told Abraham that his descendants would live in it.

God's response to Abraham's doubt is like this. Even with the fireworks in the vision, it still requires Abraham to trust God in just the way he wasn't willing to do when he asked, "How do I know that you will give them to me?"

What is the point of God's response then? In fact, what is the point of God's making the promise of the land in the first place? If God wants Abraham to have this land, why doesn't God just give it to him now?

The answer to all the questions is implicit in the answer to that last question. God wasn't trying to be Abraham's real estate agent. He was trying to develop a relationship with Abraham. But that relationship required trust in God on Abraham's part.

And trust in God came hard to Abraham. No sooner had he managed it, and gotten credit with God for it, then he lost it again, as the story makes clear.

Notice, though, how precious Abraham's trust was to God when Abraham finally did manage it: God counted it for righteousness. When we lament our sins and long for righteousness, this is a good story to remember.

ESCAPING TO PRAY. Jesus did it again. He stepped away from the hubbub of life to pray. He took three friends who were drowsed by sleep on this retreat. But pray he still did. And God spoke from the cloud. How is prayer filling my lenten retreat, my lenten journey? With whom will I go for some quiet and prayer? What am I doing to listen for God's voice?

Second Sunday of Lent - Genesis 15:5-12,17-18; Psalm 27; Philippians 3:17--4:1;

Luke 9:28-36

The end of crisis is cause for celebration. No one enjoys hard times; we wish them away and, once gone, try to forget them. Two biblical heroes in today's readings show us that personal suffering can serve the good of the community.

Abraham, in the Genesis passage, is completely frustrated. God promised a great nation, yet he is still without a son. How could this man be confident in God's promise of a great nation when he could not even count a single son? In spite of the questioning, Abraham confirms again his faith in the Lord. Once Abraham opened himself completely by this act of faith, the promise took a new turn. Now Abraham would have not only countless descendants but also a huge tract of land. This faith in time of crisis became Abraham's heritage to Israel.

Jesus' crisis is his pending passion, death, and resurrection. This awareness leads to prayer so intense that his appearance is changed in the Transfiguration. The prayer leads to the reassuring presence of the Father and the Spirit. Moses and Elijah appear with Jesus. Both of them experienced crises and also found their solutions in God's presence. Jesus learned that his passion and death would not be the last word. They were steps leading to the glory of the Resurrection and Ascension (see Luke 24:26). Jesus' crisis is for the benefit of us all.

We all know brokenness in relationships, in health, in finances, in self-confidence. We join Abraham and Jesus in victory over crises by trusting God and serving one another. This joining of our crises to those of the Redeemer means that we are able to stand with him on the mountain, that we are able to transform our dying into rising. This is the three-sided nature of covenant: self, God, and community.

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OUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

God asks Abraham to sacrifice a heifer, a she-goat ram, a turtledove and pigeon. Do you think God is preparing Abraham to offer the Son Isaac, whom he loves most, as a sacrifice (Gen 22:1ff)? Might God the Father be willing to let his own beloved son die in order to show how far God will go for humankind? Is Jesus willing to give his life (in union with the Father's willingness to give everything, even his son) to show how much God loves humankind? Is your mind occupied with earthly things? Who or what helps you toward your "citizenship in heaven"?

Pope Francis reflected on the Transfiguration with pilgrims gathered in St. Peter's Square. The mountain is the site of the encounter (of) intimate closeness with God—the place of prayer, in which to stand in the presence of the Lord. We, the disciples of Jesus, are called to be people who listen to His voice and take his words seriously. To listen to Jesus, we must follow Him.
