Trust After Heartbreak In the Gospel Reading, the risen Jesus appears to ten of his apostles. Thomas is missing. The ten are convinced; but when Thomas rejoins them after Jesus has vanished, Thomas is highly skeptical.

A week later, Jesus appears to all eleven of them and invites Thomas to make good on his skeptical challenge. Jesus tells him, Put your finger in my wounds and believe! And then, without so much as touching Jesus, Thomas believes.

Actually, then, all Thomas did was see Jesus and his wounds, and then he believed. But, of course, that is just what the other ten apostles did in the first appearance of Christ, when Thomas was absent.

So why didn't Christ make his first appearance to the apostles at a time when Thomas was there too? Why did Christ first appear when Thomas was absent? Why single Thomas out in this way?

When heartbreak is so powerful, it can need space to breathe.

Thomas had trusted Jesus and believed he was the Messiah. But then the Romans killed Jesus; and when they did, they also killed the hope in Jesus that Thomas had. How much Thomas trusted before the crucifixion can be understood by the way Thomas hardened his heart against trust in the aftermath. "The bigger they are, the harder they fall," we say. And the bigness of Thomas' heart and the greatness of his trust in Jesus can be seen by how hard Thomas fell when he thought his trust was betrayed.

Thomas thought he had made a fool of himself by believing in Jesus, and he was not going to let his heart be broken again. And so when he heard the other apostles express their belief, he scoffed. In scoffing, Thomas protected himself against further heartbreak by turning his back on Jesus and all that Jesus meant to him.

And maybe that is why Jesus left Thomas out of his first appearance to the apostles. When heartbreak is so powerful, it can need space to breathe, to let its pain come to fruition. Maybe if Thomas had not been able to move all the way from heartbreak to skepticism, he would not have been able to move back to Jesus so powerfully either.

Without any more evidence than any of the other apostles had, Thomas says to Jesus, "My Lord and my God!" Eleonore Stump

Second Sunday of Easter (Divine Mercy)

Acts 5:12-16; Psalm 118; Revelation 1:9-13,17-19; John 20:19-31

To accept the message of Jesus is no easy matter. The gospel's challenges are unrelenting for the believer and seemingly ridiculous for the nonbeliever. Today's readings suggest how our faith response can counteract our fear and hesitancy to follow Christ wholeheartedly.

Luke, the author of the Acts of the Apostles, provides a summary of the Christian faith. Luke's portrait is idyllic, yet it clearly shows a faith community growing in the face of formidable obstacles.

The Book of Revelation, source of the second reading, stems from a persecution in Asia Minor. Christians, toward the end of the first century, feared the consequences of refusing to worship the emperor. Revelation's message is that Jesus' Resurrection has destroyed death, fear is useless, and faith is victory.

The gospel passage also focuses on the very real human experience of fear. The disciples seek the security of secret rooms and locked doors. Only the presence of Jesus is able to calm their anxieties and enable Thomas to profess: "My Lord and my God" (John 20:28). We are all strengthened by his proclamation!

Twentieth-century believers do not rest their faith against the signs and wonders found in the Acts of the Apostles, nor are we tested by persecution. Yet we do know fear. Each of us has our personal secret room and locked doors. We may be afraid of challenges. We may not want to look to the faith needs of others. We may not want to be labeled as overly pious. All of us are at least distant relatives of Thomas; we are victims of fear.

The doubting Thomas within us must be touched. We are asked to respond to the wounds within ourselves and others. Even in our weakness, we are urged to breathe forth the Spirit so that the wounds may be healed and our fears overcome. Faith will free us!

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QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

Discuss the effectiveness of the apostles' missionary efforts in the light of "Power is made perfect in weakness." (2 Cor 12:9-10, 13:14) Do you want Christ to use you on behalf of others? What are the implications?

In this reading, John says he fell down "as though dead." Christ, who "once was dead, but now am alive," touched him and raised him up. Could this vision give you strength to do good things? Are you part of what, in Christ's words, "will happen afterwards?"

Why do you think Jesus breathed on the disciples when he gave them the Holy Spirit? "The Lord God formed man out of the clay of the ground and blew into his nostrils the breath of life ..." (Genesis 2:7). What effect did this gift have on the disciples' fear? How about your fear, in various aspects of your life? What do forgiveness of sin and resurrection have in common?
