This week the Catholic Church celebrates the image and feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. As with many images of both scripture and church art, they move us to embrace the love of God and imitate it in our own actions. The statue of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in the shrine area east of the parish center was a gift to St Paul Parish by a doctor living in Chicago who would participate in mass with the parish when visiting in the area. The feastday and statue remind us of the outpouring of love and concern Jesus made by his life on earth, teaching of the love of God and our neighbor by word and example. Are we learning to be grateful and generous from our experiences of God's and other people's blessing showered upon us collectively? St Paul Parish Council began a reflection on the \$50,000.00 grant that was provided to St Paul by donors and Catholic Extension Society when the church/hall was being constructed in 1988, and approved a contribution of 10,000 from reserve funds to assist another poor parish in Arkansas to furnish a building to become their church.. Besides the parishioner pledges, an outside patron granted St Paul \$40,000.00 in 2010 when we were attempting the construction of the new church. Because of a plea for assistance, the Sisters of the Good Shepherd has been supplying altar bread without charge to St Francis DeSales for at least 15 years. Contributions to church are ideally for extending the mission of the Church by sharing as we have received. Stepping stones were constructed from the sidewalk to the Sacred Heart statue to encourage opportunities for deepening our devotion and imitating a loving heart. You're encouraged to use them.

SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST (CORPUS CHRISTI) – **Eating and drinking.** Luke's gospel is filled with stories of dining in the Kingdom of God. Jesus is willing to eat with anyone. Today he feeds about five thousand men – who knows how many women and children. Such abundance! All of this gospel eating and drinking foreshadows the Last Supper (recounted in the Second Reading today and in every Eucharistic Prayer), which sets the table for dining at Sunday Eucharist week after week. Eat **and** drink Body **and** Blood. Why do I want to do both each Sunday? Even if resources **seem** meager, how can I trust the abundance of God? How will the mercy works of feeding and of giving drink guide my actions this week?

Solemnity of The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Genesis 14:18-20; Psalm 110; 1 Corinthians 11:23-26; Luke 9:11-17

Have you ever seen two people sitting at the same table in a restaurant yet never speaking a word to each other? The social dimension seems totally absent, the meal becomes nothing more than satisfying the body's need for food and drink.

The readings for the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ urge us to see the Eucharistic meal as an experience of one another. The wheat and grapes embrace the entire planet as they become bread and wine; the bread and wine embrace all creation as they become the body and blood of Jesus.

The Genesis passage has Abram returning home from a successful battle. He meets Melchizedek, the priest-king of Salem; the two share a meal of bread and wine and so form a bond by which they commit themselves to mutual obligations.

Paul, in today's passage from the First Letter to the Corinthians, warns against situations where some hoard the food and drink while others go hungry. Paul reminds the Christian community that Christ's words were "Do this in remembrance of me" (verse 24). An authentic celebration of the Eucharist occurs when those participating truly put on Christ. This means mirroring the self-giving of Jesus in their daily lives. It is only by providing for the needs of all that Corinthians of old and Christians of today genuinely celebrate the Lord's Supper.

The gospel passage describes the multiplication of the loaves. Luke places this miracle immediately after Jesus' preaching about the kingdom of God, a kingdom where the needs of all are satisfied. Luke also makes it clear that this miracle has a eucharistic dimension. Christ follows the pattern found at the Last Supper and on the road to Emmaus: taking, blessing and thanking, breaking, and giving (Luke 9:16; 22:19; 24:30).

The Eucharist is not a private devotion separate from the rest of our lives. In eating and drinking we commit ourselves to serve Jesus Christ who is manifested in the needs and problems of our brothers and sisters around the world.

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

Discuss the properties of bread and wine, including their benefits to the body when consumed. Why do you think Melchizedek chose them for offerings? Why do you think Jesus chose them?

What do we believe Jesus meant when he said, "Do this in remembrance of me"? To what does "this" refer? Could it mean more than one thing?

The crowd had been listening all day, spellbound by Jesus' words, in a deserted area away from villages. How would the disciples have taken care of so many hungry people? How did Jesus?
