**Sweat and Toil** We have reached the point in Luke's gospel where Jesus is setting out on his 'great journey' to Jerusalem, a journey which symbolizes our journey through life toward death and resurrection. In the course of our journey we are to follow Christ. "Come after me," Jesus says, and our response is to be: "I will be your follower wherever you go."

We can ask if we follow Christ. Do we walk in the way of the cross or do we follow some other way?

We can ask how we follow Christ. Do we follow Christ through some special calling or through the ordinary Christian vocation and through the acceptance of the challenge of daily living?

We can ask which Christ do we follow. Do we follow a Christ of our own making, one that confirms us in our present lifestyle, or do we follow the Christ of the gospels, especially the Gospel of Luke: the humble Christ dedicated to the liberation of the poor and oppressed?

The call to follow Christ is no mean challenge: "Let the dead bury their dead; come away and proclaim the kingdom of God.

" Sweat and toil, which work necessarily involves in the present condition of the human race, present the Christian and everyone who is called to follow Christ with the possibility of sharing lovingly in the work that Christ came to do. This work of salvation came about through suffering and death on a cross.

By enduring the toil of work in union with Christ crucified for us, man in a way collaborates with the son of God for the redemption of humanity. He shows himself a true disciple of Christ by carrying the cross in his turn every day in the activity that he is called upon to perform. Pope John Paul II, Laborem Exercens, 1981: 27

**TRAVELING TO JERUSALEM.** Today, Saint Luke tells us that Jesus travels, that is, "sets his face" toward Jerusalem. On the way, he challenges three more people about following him. And from this Chapter 9 to the end of the gospel, Jesus is always turned toward his destiny. Our journey in faith is also to Jerusalem – heaven, our lasting home. What challenge does Jesus give me about following? Who will I stop following so I can follow Jesus home? How will I "set my face" toward heaven in each thought, word, and deed?

## Thirteenth Sunday of the Year

1 Kings 19:16, 19-21; Psalm 16; Galatians 5:1,13-18; Luke 9:51-62

Most of us have known, at one time or another, the fear of being replaced. A firstborn child wonders if the new baby will take over Mom's affection; teens are anxious over losing special friends; husbands and wives become fearful when the spouse seems distant. Transition is inevitable and usually challenging.

The first reading today dramatizes a transition that is not fearful but even gracious. With complete trust, Elijah anoints Elisha as his successor, just as the Lord had asked. Elisha does not push aside the older prophet, but shows him reverence, "Then he set out and followed Elijah, and became his servant" (1 Kings 19:21).

The prophets' mutual respect is echoed in Galatians: "Through love become slaves to one another" (Galatians 5:13). Paul teaches today that the Christian's ability to serve is based on freedom. The fundamental freedom won by Christ is found not around us but within us. This gift is chosen when we free ourselves from selfishness by taking responsibility for our decisions, by reaching beyond ourselves to others in love. "The whole law is summed up in a single commandment: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself'" (Galatians 5:14).

Discipleship requires a wholehearted commitment to the Lord and a generous spirit of service toward his people. The demands are severe. Jesus, in today's gospel, says, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God" (Luke 9:62). The people of Jesus' time understood this agrarian imagery. The farmer has to keep his eyes fixed straight ahead, otherwise the neatly organized field required for planting would be turned into a chaotic nightmare at harvesting time.

The demand sounds harsh, especially when Jesus says, "Let the dead bury their own dead." This is not disrespect for our deceased, but simply a realization that we must live without regret over the past. If we keep our eye on the present, then the fields of our lives will have the grace and order of newly plowed spring fields. Our lives will hold great promise for a rich harvest.
