**What's To Hate?** In the Gospel Reading, Jesus recommends hatred—of your mother and father, of your wife (or husband), in fact, of your very life.

What's to hate about these people? How can Jesus say that unless you hate them, you can't be his disciple? Didn't Jesus command us to love our neighbors as ourselves? How can you hate your life if you love yourself?

More was true to the Lord he loved and to himself.

Well, think of St. Thomas More. Henry VIII of England wanted his own marriage to his wife annulled so that he could marry another woman, Anne. (Anglicans and Catholics both have troublesome characters in their history!) When the Pope wouldn't agree to what Henry wanted, Henry declared himself supreme head of the Church in England. Thomas More was Chancellor of England then, and Henry wanted More to support him in all this. Henry wanted More to sign the Oath of Supremacy declaring Henry the Supreme Head of the Church in England.

More saw that Henry's passion for Anne was moving Henry to betray his wife and bring scandal on the Church. And More wouldn't support him. He wouldn't sign the Oath.

So More resigned his chancellorship and went home. But Henry pursued him. First, he stripped More of his income and property, and then he imprisoned him. More's wife was frantic. More's children were heart-broken. They thought that More's life hung in the balance, and they were right.

Couldn't More have just signed that Oath? His wife would have had him home. His children would have rejoiced at his return. He would have kept his property. He would have kept his life.

But he would have lost his life in keeping it. He would have betrayed the Lord he loved if he had signed that Oath.

So More lost all his possessions. He left his wife and children behind and went to prison. And finally he went to his death, for love of the Lord. This is the kind of hatred of life and loved ones that the Lord is talking about. More loved his family and his life, but he let go of everything for love of Christ.

Because he maintained his integrity and did not let Henry push him into evil, More was true to the Lord he loved and to himself. He could not have loved himself or his wife or his children or his neighbors better than he did. Eleonore Stump

**BEING A DISCIPLE.** Jesus is relentless. One more time he tells the great crowd: carry your cross, renounce possessions, be my disciple. Following him requires relentless behavior. We are to have an unwavering preference for Jesus above parents and family. But we cannot forget that care for them and all others is also attention to Jesus Christ. It is both-and. Always. How will I behave to assure myself I am following Jesus? What must I do to carry my cross one more day, one more week? What possession(s) can I give away for someone else to use?

## **Twenty-Third Sunday of the Year**

Wisdom 9:13-18; Psalm 90; Philemon 9-10,12-17; Luke 14:25-33

"The good life" is an expression used to describe those who seem to have it all, at least in terms of material possessions. While there is nothing intrinsically wrong with having nice things, we know there's more to genuine living than interest rates and credit cards. Today's Scriptures teach the fullness of life in the light of God's wisdom.

The Wisdom passage shows how the human condition, by its very nature, requires divine assistance. If we are to learn the art of genuine living, God must communicate the spirit of wisdom. "Spirit" is actually a biblical category that connotes life, vitality, and closeness to God (see Ezekiel 37:9-14). Spirit-filled wisdom saves people; being wise means being alive in God.

Psalm 90 pleads for wisdom of heart as a way to combat human sinfulness and failure. This wisdom is the art of correct living, of adapting to life's problems, and of interacting with the God of Israel. God's presence makes life not a burden to be endured but a gift to be celebrated.

Luke has Jesus speak about the demands of discipleship. He gathers three sayings (Luke 14:26-27,33) and two parables (Luke 14:28-32). The second parable is a commentary on wisdom and life, explaining that to enjoy life in the kingdom the disciple must be wise enough to see the implications of his or her choices.

Both parables highlight the need to use wisdom in assessing the cost of discipleship. The tower builder and the warring king both must calculate the costs and study the risks before making a final decision. The disciple must know that following Christ requires an allegiance that will always be the highest priority. To accept the person of Christ is to accept his cross as well.

The Christian need not oppose human progress nor reject comforts and pleasures. The believer must assess these within the delicate balance of wisdom and life. Wisdom challenges: Does our happiness come from the mere acquisition of possessions or from sharing and interacting with God and neighbor?

Does God give you help when you are unclear? Which do you think God prefers in you, perfect certainty– or your best guess, trusting in God?

Can you name some people who lived/live in Christ and have possessed nothing? What does this freedom allow them to do?
