All Scripture is Inspired by God The Second Reading says that "all Scripture is inspired by God and useful" for training in righteousness. And this line sounds wonderful until it bumps up against the First Reading. In the First Reading, Moses avails himself of the special power of God to help Joshua destroy the Amalekites in a war.

This story about the Amalekites is a good example of Scriptural stories that prompt outrage in many contemporary readers. It presents God as helping the Israelites to slaughter their enemies. Why shouldn't we reject this story as morally repellant? And if we do, then what happens to the line that all Scripture is inspired of God.

Well, here is one way to accept the story of the Amalekites as part of God's inspired revelation.

The process of dying can be an important part of the journey of spiritual healing,

Human beings are meant to live in everlasting joyful union with their Creator, who loves them. But it is possible for human beings instead to become seriously spiritually sick. If that sickness is bad enough, it is possible for people to become the living dead, still functioning in some sense but spiritually dead, lost to love and union forever.

To ward off this worst thing for human beings, a loving God will go to great lengths.

So will we. Just think about what we will let our children suffer in hospitals in the hope of healing them, and you will see the point. God will endure even appalling suffering on the part of the human beings he loves if that suffering holds a chance of a spiritual cure.

In fact, the process of dying can be an important part of the journey of spiritual healing, as anyone knows who has worked with the dying in hospitals.

Maybe the terrible things that happen when a people loses a war are like this too. Think about it this way: would Germany have been better off if it had won the Second World War? Wasn't it a blessing for the Germans that they lost it?

And so we can think about the First Reading this way. God's love encompasses the Amalekites, too. His great love for them, his hope for their salvation, underlies his willingness to let them suffer even the terrible devastation that comes to them in the loss of the war with the Israelites.

And that is the beginning of an explanation for why it is possible to accept even the First Reading as divinely inspired Scripture.



Like Moses on the hill and like the persistent widow in today's parable, no weary praying is faithful praying. With whom will I pray for the benefit of others? If I don't, how and when will I pray every day? If I do, how will I continue? What help do I need to be persistent in prayer?

## **Twenty-Ninth Sunday of the Year**

Exodus 17:8-13; Psalm 121; 2 Timothy 3:14--4:2; Luke 18:1-8

Perseverance is the price of victory. Human growth and success are not instantly accessible like information from our computers. The readings today recall the need for unceasing human diligence, even in the face of frequent failure.

The Exodus passage pits a heroic Moses against Israel's implacable enemy, the Amalekites. In a book filled with divine exploits, we see here the significant difference made by the human accomplishments of Moses. The hero's steadfastness wins the day. The steady hands in Exodus 17:12 demonstrate Moses' faithfulness in carrying out an official task.

Psalm 121 says that we are able to trust in God's divine care but also admits that sometimes our human trust crumbles under tensions and pressures. The psalmist, for example, worries about the danger of one's foot slipping and the possibility that Yahweh might fall asleep (verse 3). The psalm does finally affirm that the Lord is a constantly vigilant guardian and that believers must be persistent in calling out to Yahweh.

The psalmist's theme is found also in Luke's parable of the dishonest judge: Pray always and never give up. If a dishonest judge eventually yields to the pressure of a persistent widow, then naturally God will act upon the prayer of his persevering people. Even better, God does not procrastinate like the judge; if we cry out day and night, the Lord will act promptly. Luke concludes that God expects this pleading from us; at the time of the Second Coming, Christ will examine our persistence in prayer.

The Exodus account of Moses' greatness and Luke's parable on persistent prayer clearly define our human neediness. We need to begin anew each day, to work hard every day at building loving and trusting relationships with one another and with God. We need persevering prayer as our source of strength and hope. We need to admit that perseverance is the price of success.

What does Jesus' injunction, "Pray always ..." mean to you? Do you think Jesus means only prayers of petition? What does Jesus want to make clear to you about petitioning God? Discuss this statement: "When you pray for rain, take an umbrella."
