THE GOOD NEWS In the <u>Gospel</u> Reading for this Sunday, Jesus talks about things that will happen to his followers at some end time. The Greek word translated "gospel" means "good news." And what good things is Jesus predicting? Well, earthquakes, famines, plagues, wars, persecutions, betrayals, imprisonment, and executions.

A person could be forgiven for wondering what happened to the good news.

But what makes a life good for Christians? Isn't it being Christ-like?

What was Christ like?

In his infancy, he lived through the war that King Herod waged against the children of Bethlehem. In his childhood, he lived in a country that was conquered by the Romans. In his adulthood, he was betrayed by his intimate friend Judas. And at the end of his life he was persecuted and put to death by the rulers of his society. All the things—well, virtually all the things—that Jesus predicted for his people in the end time were part of his own life, too.

So if you were hoping for a life of ease, leisure, and video games, you weren't hoping to be Christ-

like, were you?

But what is *good* about Christ-likeness, you might think to yourself, if this is what it turns out to be?

Why isn't Jesus' prediction just depressing?

Well, look at the First Reading. It seems to be depicting an end time, too, doesn't it? Only this end time must come after the time Jesus is describing. In the time Jesus is talking about, the bad guys win. In the end time that the First Reading portrays, the bad guys lose; and they lose big. They don't manage to hang on to either their past—their roots, or their future—their branches.

Everything that goes to make them up is lost by fire.

Who would want to be them?

In the final end time that the First Reading predicts, everyone will be able to understand what is good about being Christ-like. At that time, Christ will come as the Sun of Justice. All those who are like him will live forever with him; and, like him, they will shine like the sun.

So, if we are like Christ in his first coming, in his suffering, we will be found like him at his second coming, too.

That is good news, isn't it?

STANDING WITH THE POOR. At the end of the Jubilee of Mercy in 2017, Pope Francis established this second-last Sunday of the liturgical year as the World Day of the Poor. How fitting it is that as we look to the end our lives, to the end of the world, and to the final coming of Christ, we look to the poor. Let us sing the Psalm each day this week: "The Lord comes to rule the earth with justice." How will I equally treat each person with justice? How will I be generous? How will I care for the poor?

Thirty-Third Sunday of the Year

Malachi 3:19-20; Psalm 98; 2 Thessalonians 3:7-12; Luke 21:5-19

Fidelity, steadfast faithfulness, is an ongoing challenge to Christians and all people of goodwill. This virtue is essential to marriage and family, church and religion, business and politics. Today's readings urge believers to practice fidelity.

In the first half of the fifth century B.C., an anonymous prophet (Malachi simply means "my messenger") addressed the concerns of the Jewish people. Today's verses, for example, speak to the age-old question of good and evil. On the Day of the Lord, fire will rain down upon the evildoers, and the just will enjoy the healing rays of the sun. The prophet's advice is that all prepare for this day by remaining faithful to the Lord's ways.

The second reading deals with those Thessalonian Christians who believed that Jesus' Second Coming (the Parousia) was imminent (2 Thessalonians 2:2). Paul attacks this false teaching that causes people to be so anxious about the Lord's arrival that they stop working. Paul insists that all be active workers for the Lord's cause and so earn their daily bread. There is no need to worry about the Second Coming; people have already been taught the signs of that time (2 Thessalonians 2:1-15). Be faithful!

Luke wrote his gospel after the destruction of Jerusalem (A.D. 70) was an accomplished fact. In today's section, however, he presents Jesus as a prophetic figure who exhorts his followers to fidelity and who announces the destruction of the Temple. Luke divides this section into three parts: (1) the fate of the Temple (verses. 5-7); (2) signs before the end (verses. 8-11); and (3) advice for coping with persecution (verses. 12-19). Victory is promised to those who remain faithful: "But not a hair of your head will perish" (Luke 21:18).

In a different time, our challenge remains the same -- to see our trials against the background of Jesus. In the crucible of everyday life we must embrace the cross, history's classic example of faithful love and triumphant victory.
