Our First Priority We can be critical of the old family structure reflected in the command for wives to be submissive to their husbands, but we must admit that the old structure worked in many ways. Families were stable social units, contributing much to the right ordering of society.

We no longer feel comfortable with wives being submissive to husbands, and just the reading of this passage in today's liturgy offends some people. Perhaps we ought to accept this reading as a challenge to find a new family structure that works.

The alternative to the old family structure should not be an absence of structure resulting in the breakdown of the family; rather, it should be a new family structure built around mutual love and equal partnership.

The celebration of the Holy Family should serve as a reminder to us that the family is holy; that there is a reflection of our Trinitarian God in the father, mother and child of the family; and that there will be no order in society if there is not stability in family life.

As a nation, we need to make children and families our first priority, to invest in their future; to combat the forces—cultural, economic and moral—which hurt children and destroy families; to manage our economy, shape our government, and direct our institutions to support and not undermine our families.

EVERY FAMILY IS HOLY. Pope Francis was not the first to urge us to see and be holy people. Saint Paul, in Colossians 3:12-17, calls us holy and beloved – and lists holy behaviors. It recalls the Old Testament covenants and the very peak of creation told in Genesis – human life. How will I, in phone call or letter, speak words of love to my siblings and parents? How will I be ever more holy this day? How will I help families who grieve or hunger or want?

Feast of the Holy Family

Sirach 3:2-6,12-14; Psalm 128; Colossians 3:12-21; Matthew 2:13-15,19-23

Today's readings take up the tension between rights and obligations. The passages maintain that obligations have primacy over rights. Hence the truly human, genuinely Christian priority is not so much what others can do for me but rather what I can do for others. Preoccupation with self must be set aside as we cast ourselves in the role of servant rather than served.

Ben Sira, early second-century B.C. author of today's first reading, offers a brief but invaluable commentary on the fourth commandment: Honor your father and your mother. He describes the earthly rewards that belong to those who revere their parents. On the other hand, he sees this reverence as atonement for sin, so it is a question of obligation to elders rather than rights of the young.

The second reading deals with the Christian life as it is to be lived in the Christian home. The characteristics of the believing family are mutual forgiveness, love, peace, and gratitude modeled on the self-giving of Christ.

Matthew shows the family of Jesus to be clearly rooted in fidelity to God's Word. Joseph accepts the command to leave Israel and then return again at a later date. Joseph places the accent on obligations first.

Jesus must be the cohesive center of family life. Jesus is self-giving, a model for family members who have obligations first and then rights. The symbol of the cross must function as the domestic code, because in that symbol we die to self in order to live for Christ in others.

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QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION Why do you think Sirach says that good things happen to you when you honor your parents (prayers heard, sins atoned, long life—made happy by children)? In his letter to the Colossians St. Paul gives some ideas about how we can love each other and live in harmony. Have compassion, kindness, humility, patience, bearing with one another, and forgiving each other—is this easy? How are you doing with Paul's assignment as Church? How are you doing with it in your life?

Does Joseph have second thoughts about leaving his job, dwelling, or possessions when the angel tells him to take Mary and flee to Egypt? What was the only thing that was important to the holy family? How far will you step out of your comfort zone for other people? Name some ways you can insure the safety or well being of your brothers and sisters in Christ.
