**Here and Now** When the Lord was baptized, a voice came from heaven saying "This is my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." There could hardly be a more important message than this identification of Jesus, could there?

But why did this important message come through a voice from heaven? A voice from heaven can be heard only by those who are *there then*. What about everybody else? Surely, it is important for all human beings to know that Jesus is God's beloved Son.

And the same sort of puzzle arises from the <u>First Reading</u>. It says that the Messiah will open the eyes of the blind, and the Gospels testify that Christ really did so. But he opened the eyes of only a few blind people, those blind people who were *there then*. What about all the other blind people, in other places, in other times? Why didn't Jesus just heal all blindness everywhere with one impersonal command: let all the blind people of the world be healed?

And so here is one thing we can learn from these Readings. In the voice from heaven, in the miracles of Christ, God shows that he is committed to the good of particularity. God does not send the news about the Messiah as an impersonal message directed impartially to all humankind. He identifies Jesus as his Son by a voice from heaven heard by particular people at a particular time. Similarly, Christ does not issue an impersonal decree about nameless blind people taken as a group. Christ heals some particular blind people who happened to be at a particular place at the particular time when Christ was also there.

So you might feel that you are just an unnoticed member of your company or an invisible one of the many ordinary people in your town. But you stand out as the particular person you are, where the Lord is concerned. God does not deal with people as faceless members of a collective. He calls, and he heals one particular person at a time, as each individual comes to him.

But then you yourself—not your Church or your group, but *you*—need to come to the Lord, to face him, to know him, to love him, and to let him heal you. Come as yourself, as you are, *here* and *now*. Eleonore Stump

**NO PARTIALITY**. Saint Peter declares this truth: God shows no partiality. God may be my God, but God does not love me – or only mine – the best. God is not only on my side. God is on every side. God loves everyone and everything. On this day recalling the Baptism of Jesus, we cherish our own Baptism into him. Baptism calls us to discipleship and to mission. How will I, like Jesus, go about doing good this day? How will I, like Jesus, bring forth justice – even in some small way? How will I be at peace?

## Feast of the Baptism of the Lord

Isaiah 42:1-4,6-7; Psalm 29; Acts 10:34-38; Matthew 3:13-17

The private believer is a public servant. Because of separation of church and state, we North Americans may choose to make faith entirely personal and in no way communal. But today's readings tell a different story.

The vocation accounts in today's readings are not accounts of specially chosen people who experience a calling merely for themselves. Rather, these people are inextricably bound up with the needs of the community.

Around 540 B.C. an anonymous prophet (whom we call Second Isaiah) exhorts his exiled community in Babylon to respond to God's call to return to the land of Israel. He speaks of the Servant, that is himself, and all those believers who are willing to participate in this new but daring challenge. It is the task of this prophetic royal Servant to demonstrate Yahweh's power to Israel and indirectly to the entire world.

Luke, the author of Acts, points out that salvation is for everyone. Luke then substantiates this by citing the early Christian proclamation concerning Jesus who, like the herald of Isaiah 52:7, brought good news to Israel. Luke demonstrates Jesus' exercise of his calling by noting his good works and healings.

Matthew makes Jesus' baptismal scene a public event. For Matthew, Jesus is clearly the Servant of the Lord, who has received God's Spirit to provide for the needs of the people. In the baptism, Matthew shows not only the intimate relationship between Father and Son but also the consequences of that relationship. The private believer is a public servant.

In receiving the life of the Church, the Christian is called upon to sustain the life of the Church. Faith, therefore, implies concern for others. Like the Servant in Second Isaiah, the believer is to replace darkness with light. Like the Servant in Matthew, the believer is to replace pain with healing. Far from being purely a private gift, faith is a public responsibility.

Was the Trinity present at the baptism of Jesus? Do you think the Father and Holy Spirit were with Jesus throughout his entire earthly life even when he was on the cross? Do you think they are with you even when you feel as though they are absolutely not?
