The Way Things Are In the Gospel Reading God sent the Magi by means of heavenly signs to the baby Jesus. In the end, the signs in heaven were not enough; but there was a special revelation about this child that added the missing element. When they did find the child, the Magi left him rich gifts. And then God warned the Magi in a dream not to return to King Herod to tell him where the baby was. Because of that dream, the Magi went home another way, and the baby was kept safe from Herod.

Just look at all the things God does for this one child! Signs in heaven, miraculously helpful strangers, special messages from God, rich gifts, and warning dreams, divine protection against powerful bad people.

God will call his people and shepherd them—but he will not force them.

How many children die who might have been saved if even one of these things had been done for them? A sign that brings help from afar, a special instruction from God, huge amounts of money, a dream that protects from bad guys—these things are not enough to keep all children from early death, but surely many children could have been saved by any of these means.

Why does God give all these things to Jesus? Why doesn't God give even some of them to all children?

The answer to both questions is the same, I think.

The first thing that happens after the Fall is that Abel, one of the children of Adam and Eve, dies at the hand of Cain, their other child. God could have protected Abel from Cain by any of the means God used to help Jesus—but God doesn't do so. From the very beginning of our post-Fall world, God establishes the following policy: he will not force anybody to do what is good or omit what is evil. God will call his people and shepherd them—but he will not force them. And so countless children die because of the evil of other human beings.

But the powerless baby Jesus is God's best hope of healing human evil. Jesus is God's call of love. And that is why God's power can be used to keep Jesus from dying as a baby. He needs to die on the cross. That death is the last, most powerful call of love.



TRAVELERS. The Magi brought gifts with them. Although King Herod was greatly troubled, Jesus and his parents did not fear these travelers. God was with them all. And God is with us and everyone even to this day. Whom do I fear? How can I be like Jesus and his parents and the Magi to accept everyone? What will I do to assure pathways of peace for migrants, travelers, refugees, and aliens?

Feast of the Epiphany

Isaiah 60:1-6; Psalm 72; Ephesians 3:2-3,5-6; Matthew 2:1-12

Revelation is the sharing of values. We often imagine God's revelation to be much more complicated than that. We think of difficult doctrines, of theologians pouring over dusty tomes, of solemn pronouncements from the Vatican. Today's Scriptures deal with concrete situations in which God reveals the Divine viewpoint on reality -- God's system of values that gives a new world view.

The author of the first passage is trying to console the despondent people of Jerusalem. The exile is over, but only a trickle of God's people have returned home. The people are doubting their own worth and esteem. Was God still interested? The prophet answers by describing Jerusalem as a city bathed in light because Yahweh resides there. This light is so brilliant that exiles and gift-bearing Gentiles converge on the city, making clear the value of all people in God's eyes.

The author of Ephesians communicates a facet of God's plan for salvation. This new revelation is that the Gentiles are in communion with Israel. The Gentiles thus are coheirs and partners in salvation. The wall of separation between Jew and Gentile is destroyed (see Ephesians 2:14). Dignity is realized by sharing the inheritance with Israel.

Matthew writes at a critical moment in the life of his community. Many Gentiles were entering the community, but many Jews were leaving it (see Matthew 21:42). In order to show that the admission of the Gentiles is part of God's plan, he tells the story of the astrologers. The pagan astrologers are the first to pay homage to the newborn King of the Jews; the Jewish leadership rejects this King. The faith of the gentile astrologers is meant to challenge the Jewish defectors.

The central revelation in Christianity is the belief that God has spoken God's greatest word in God's Son, Jesus. The Incarnation is a value judgment about humanity: All have dignity because Jesus became one of us. All are to be respected.

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION Did Jerusalem have light of her own, apart from God? Were nations coming to her or just to the light? What do you think draws people to the Church today, power or tenderness?

Paul says that a revelation was given him by the Spirit. He said that Christ's life was too great to be limited to its starting place. His life was for all generations and not only the Jews but the Gentiles as well. All are "coheirs, members of the same body.

God sent the Magi a message that caused them to ride camels half way across the known world. What would cause you to put forth this kind of effort? These wise men were responsive to revelations from God and their openness brought them to Bethlehem. They were not disappointed. Is there a lesson here?
