Bread from Heaven When the Israelites came out of Egypt, God did one miracle after another for them. He got water from a rock when they were thirsty; and, when they were hungry, he fed them with bread from heaven. "Mah nah?—what is this?" the Israelites asked when they saw it; and 'manna' has been its name ever since.

Why didn't God just miraculously produce real, ordinary bread for them?

They learned to trust in God, who fed them with what they needed to live.

Moses answers this question in his speech to the people: God fed them with manna so that they might know one does not live by bread alone. If God had fed them ordinary bread, they wouldn't have learned the lesson. As it was, first they hungered, and then they were fed miraculously with the who-knows-what-this-is bread from heaven. And so they learned to trust in God, who fed them with what they needed to live.

But this is only half the lesson, as Moses explains it: one does not live by bread alone; what else is needed is the word of God.

And so, when the time was right, the only-begotten Word of God came so that people might not perish but have ever-lasting life (John 3:16).

That is why Christ said that he was the true bread from heaven. One does not live by bread alone but by this true Word of God.

And, by a miracle which completes the lesson of the manna, this Word is the bread of life for all the faithful. The Word of God and the bread from heaven are present in one here.

In the Eucharist, then, there is everything that one needs to live, if one will only learn the lesson and trust in Christ, who feeds his people with himself, the living bread from heaven and the Word of God.



To assure space for social distancing is allowed, those want to attend mass on Sunday are asked to call or email the parish office to reserve a seat.

Commemoration of the Body and Blood of Christ

Deuteronomy 8:2-3,14-16; Psalm 147; 1 Corinthians 10:16-17; John 6:51-58

Let's be honest: Sunday Eucharist is not always the most exciting hour of our week. Sometimes we feel the pressure of going because "we have to"; occasionally we encounter people in church we don't care for all that much; at times the liturgy seems a little tedious and maybe even boring.

Today's readings are upsetting invitations to reassess our eucharistic values. Do we celebrate life or do we put up with it? Do we appropriate the self-giving of Jesus or do we focus only on self?

Moses' sermon in this passage from Deuteronomy is his last instruction to the Israelites as they prepare to enter the promised land. They must remember how the Lord fed them with manna during the wilderness years, how they drank from the flinty rock. Now in the fertile land they must realize that one does not live by bread alone. God's Word ensures fullness of life. Paul writes to the divided Corinthians who were making a scandal of the Eucharist. To eat the bread and drink the wine are genuine participation in the body and blood of Christ. Eucharist and pagan ritual are contradictory.

More than likely today's passage from John's Gospel was originally part of the Last Supper narrative. The author has reshaped the passage into the bread of life discourse in John 6:35-50. The focus is now on the Eucharist, Jesus as the source of life and nourishment. As we receive the body and blood of Christ, does the teaching of John make us aware that we are indeed caught up in God's life? Corpus Christi is that special feast that proclaims: To celebrate Eucharist is to celebrate life.

Deuteronomy 8:2-3, 14b-16a. Psalm 147:12-13, 14-15, 19-20. 1 Corinthians 10:16-17. Sequence – Lauda Sion / Laud, O Zion. John 6:51-58.

Bread and Wine; Flesh and Blood. For a while – too long, it seems – most of us could not share in Holy Communion. Perhaps it is still so. We long to eat and drink because Jesus pledges that he will remain in those who do. But we believe that same Christ is present to us in other ways. When Scripture is read aloud, he speaks in our midst today. When two or three gather in his name, he is there, too. He is not distant from us.

- Let me make time each day to read and ponder one of the Sunday readings.
- Even if I cannot go to church, how will I still continue to pray?
- How will my longing for Eucharist and Communion urge me to help feed those needing daily bread?
