The Rock of the Church Does God want us to be happy? How could anyone answer "no"? How could anyone suppose God is good or loving if it is not true that he wants us to be happy?

And yet look at Christ's line in the Gospel reading. Deny yourself, Jesus tells his faithful followers; take up your cross and follow me.

What will save us from the evil that infects us and leaves us so willing to afflict others?

Denying yourself seems the very opposite of going for happiness, and the cross is an instrument of torture. Why would God want these things for his people? Does God want us to be unhappy?

A man divorcing his unaccomplished, middle-aged, dowdy wife to marry a much younger, prettier, successful woman explained his decision to his devastated wife this way. "God wants me to be happy," he told her, "and I can't be happy with you. I will be happy with her."

It seems never to have crossed the mind of this husband that God might have any care for his wife's happiness. The husband's full view of the matter could be put this way: "God wants me to be happy, but God doesn't care at all about you."

This little story, common in its selfishness, shows the sickness of the post-fall human condition, so apt to privilege its own power or pleasure over any greater goods. We can't be happy in this condition, when we are glad enough to crush others to get what we want. What is to be done with us? What will make us happy? What will save us from the evil that infects us and leaves us so willing to afflict others?

This is where Christ's line comes in. The route to the happiness God does want for us has to go through the cross of Christ. Christ is The Way for us, and the cross is where we meet him for the road to our true happiness in love and holiness in him.

Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jeremiah 20:7-9; Psalm 63; Romans 12:1-2; Matthew 16:21-27

Has Gallup ever surveyed God's opinion? The Scripture for this weekend has to do with God's point of view. These passages respect human opinion yet challenge us to discern and act in accord with God's will.

The Jeremiah excerpt is one of the so-called "confessions." Jeremiah resents his role as messenger of exclusively bad news. He is tempted to abandon his prophetic career, but the Word of God is an all-consuming fire (see Jeremiah 5:14); thus he will continue to preach.

Paul urges the Romans to think and act beyond the world's pragmatic views: "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds" (Romans 2:2). They, too, must attempt to think as God would think.

Peter, by God's revelation, understands that Jesus is the Messiah (Matthew 16:16). On the other hand, Jesus' mission as a suffering Messiah is too much for Peter to comprehend. Suffering and death should not be the path to glory. Peter suggests an easier way to fulfill God's will and thus becomes an obstacle to the mission. Jesus says, "You are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things" (Matthew 16:23). Jesus knows that to lose oneself for God's sake is to find oneself. We are practical people. We seek the opinions of physicians, lawyers, business consultants, and friends. These are reasonable paths; clearly, God is able to speak to us through other people, especially through the Christian community. Our task is to constantly monitor God's counsel. Like Jesus, we assume that God may have a bigger and better way to accomplish God's plan! -- John Craghan, Th.D., S.S.L.

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Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time –August 30, 2020

Jeremiah 20:7-9. Psalm 63:2, 3-4, 5-6, 8-9. Romans 12:1-2. Matthew 16:21-27. **Overcoming Obstacles.** Jeremiah complains that because of the compelling presence of God within, he cannot **not** speak God's message. Paul urges us not to conform ourselves to **this** age. And Peter, trying to protect Jesus, blurts out "God forbid" and becomes an obstacle to Jesus' mission. Baptized followers of Jesus must **deny**, take up the **cross**, and **follow**.

- In denying self, how will I attend to another's need this week?
- What is the cross I bear for the sake of the Kingdom of Heaven?
- How will I follow, not the greed of this age, but the goodness of Christian life?
