**Love and Forgiveness** In the Gospel reading, Peter wants to know how many times he has to forgive someone who sins against him. What is the number of times, Peter wants to know, that he has to forgive that sinner? But this question is confused. There is no such number as the one Peter is looking for. There is no limit on the number of times we have to forgive someone who has sinned against us.

We are able to understand the point of this Gospel story if we see the connection between love and forgiveness. Refusing to forgive is refusing to love, and it is never acceptable not to love. That is why it is never right to withhold forgiveness either.

God's forgiveness is always there, and so is God's love.

The relation between love and forgiveness also helps us see the difference between forgiving a wrongdoer and enabling him to continue in his wrongdoing. Love wants the good for the beloved. A person who forgives a sinner loves that sinner; and because she loves him, she has a heart for his good. A wife who continues to live with a husband who beats her isn't forgiving him. She's helping him to get worse. There is nothing loving or forgiving about enabling a person to get worse. For her to forgive her husband is for her to want his good, even in the face of his bad treatment of her. But his good requires, first of all, that he stop hurting her, and then that he repent his terrible treatment of her.

If he is unrepentant, if he rejects goodness and love, then she can want the good for him anyway. But her forgiveness of him will be like a gift that can't be given because he won't receive it. Then the best she can do for him is to keep a distance from him, so that he doesn't get worse by continuing to hurt her.

God's love is like this, too. God's forgiveness is always there, and so is God's love. Because God loves every person, God offers the good to everyone too, no matter what that person's sins may be. God does not keep a careful distance from us when we sin. What stands between us and God is only our own unwillingness to receive the gift God is offering.

If we will only not reject it, the gift of God's love and forgiveness will be given to us and received.



# **Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time**

Sirach 27:30--28:7; Psalm 103; Romans 14:7-9; Matthew 18:21-35

Hurt is not easily forgiven. Our impulse very often is to strike back, if not directly, then in more subtle ways -- denying forgiveness, giving the silent treatment. Reconciliation is today's theme. If we are to imitate divine mercy, then the challenge is to look beyond ourselves and our hurt to a God who never ceases to say, "I love you and, therefore, I forgive you."

At the beginning of the second century B.C., Ben Sira compiled a compendium of Israel's wisdom, commonly known as the Book of Sirach. In this section, especially Chapter 28:2-7, he considers the theme of forgiveness. He argues that forgiveness of neighbor brings God's forgiveness of our own sins. Two more motives for mercy are the thought of death and God's covenant.

The gospel passage is part of Matthew's discourse on Church order. Problems in community are presumed. The issue is whether or not there are limits to forgiveness. Peter's suggestion of the number of times the Christian should forgive appears generous, but it is short of Jesus' view for the kingdom. For Jesus, forgiveness is more than generous, it is boundless.

Ben Sira reminds us that the wrongdoer is our brother or sister and thus vindictiveness is unacceptable. The psalmist writes that the God of Israel rejects human estimates for pardon and therefore a less than genuine forgiveness is wrong. Jesus teaches limitless mercy as the norm rather than the exception. We should forgive, not like the first official in his parable, but like the king. -- John Craghan, Th.D., S.S.L

Sirach 27:30–28:7. Psalm 103:1-2, 3-4, 9-10, 11-12. Romans 14:7-9. Matthew 18:21-35. **Seventy-Seven Times.** When is enough enough? Can we be angry now? When can we stop forgiving? If we have to forgive the same person the same thing seventy-seven times, can we stop at seventy-eight? No! Because, as Paul declares in Romans 14, we live and die for God, to whom alone we belong. We do not live for ourselves.

- Who needs my forgiveness?
- Whom will I forgive and for what perhaps, again?
- And what forgiveness do I need?
