Comfort In the First Reading, the prophet reports a command given by God: 'Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God!" In the sorrows of life, who does not long for comfort? Who would not melt with gratitude at the tender comfort of God?

But what is comfort?

To give comfort to someone is to lend him some of your strength.

Sometimes what we want is just what the good shepherd gives his lost sheep. We don't want to walk along the road of our life to the Lord. We want God to carry us.

But a child that is carried all the time will never learn to walk, to leap and run. That child, weak enough already to have to be carried, will get only weaker as the carrying goes on.

And comfort isn't a matter of giving weakness. It's a matter of giving strength—strength for walking, even over very rough roads.

In fact, the "-fort" in "comfort" comes from the Latin word for "strong." The "com-" in "comfort" is from the Latin word for "with." To give comfort to someone is to lend him some of your strength. He is more able to stand on his own feet and walk because you are with him.

But what is the comfort of God? Where is it? How do we find it?

The Gospel says that Christ baptizes his own with the Holy Spirit. Because of this baptism, the Holy Spirit comes to dwell within each person who comes to Christ.

That is why no one who comes to Christ and receives his baptism of the Holy Spirit walks the wild and rocky road of life alone. God is so much with him that, in the person of the Holy Spirit, God is within him. If God is for us, even within us, who can be against us? This is strength indeed.

And so no wonder that the other name for the Holy Spirit is "the Comforter."

VOCATION CORNER – "The priestly vocation is essentially a call to sanctity, in the form that derives from the Sacrament of Holy Orders. Sanctity is intimacy with God; it is the imitation of Christ, poor, chaste and humble; it is unreserved love for souls and self-giving to their true good; it is love for the Church which is holy and wants us to be holy, because such is the mission that Christ has entrusted to it. Each one of you must be holy also in order to help your brothers pursue their vocation to sanctity." – St. John Paul II, October 9, 1984

Second Sunday of Advent

Isaiah 40:1-5,9-11; Psalm 85; 2 Peter 3:8-14; Mark 1:1-8

At times, the hurried pace of our lives may obscure even the most dramatic reality -- for example, the gift-giving presence of our God. Today's readings speak of God's nearness in our daily lives. The Scriptures capture moments when people were challenged to react to God's presence. First they had to become aware of God's gifts, then they had to respond.

Around 540 B.C., Second Isaiah, the anonymous prophet of the exile, spoke to his despairing community. His opening words of comfort and tenderness reveal a God who, forgetting the past, offers the grace of the present moment. There had to be a march through the desert to the land of Israel; this trek would manifest God's presence, to the utter amazement of the people. Even then, the people had to become aware of the moment\!

In Psalm 85, the community asks for God's presence. Putting aside all hesitation the psalmist announces that God proclaims peace to the people. To enjoy God's gift of peace, however, the community must keep its covenant with Yahweh. It is just such a response, culminating in kindness, truth, and justice, that ushers in the blessing of the harvest.

Mark begins his gospel with the image of the desert. He quotes Second Isaiah to tell us that John the Baptist announces God's unexpected gift of salvation in the desert. Like the ninth-century prophet Elijah, John wears a garment of camel's hair and a leather belt (see 2 Kings 1:8). God's presence in the Baptist demands a response of radical conversion and of repentance.

God's gifts appear not only in extraordinary events such as a return from exile or the coming of Jesus but also in ordinary, day to day occurrences. The grace of friendship, the devotion of a spouse, the comfort of co-workers -- all these manifest God's gifts. Our awareness of giftedness moves us to a personal response where love, support, and consolation is given as well as received. -- John Craghan, Th.D., S.S.L.

Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11. Psalm 85:9-10, 11-12, 13-14. 2 Peter 3:8-14. Mark 1:1-8.

What Sort of Persons? In this Advent time of looking to the future while living in the now, Saint Peter's question is the right one: "What sort of person ought you to be?" Saint John the Baptist offers a good response and better example. He is not full of himself. He knows his minor place. He points to the One who is both with us now and is also coming.

- How will my waiting on the Lord make me more humble?
- What full-of-myself behaviors can I change, can I let go?

Works of Mercy take the focus off me for the benefit of another. What will I do?
