Glory, Glory, Hallelujah In the Gospel, some Greeks ask to see Jesus. Jesus responds by saying that anyone who loves his life will lose it. To gain your life, you have to be like a grain of wheat: it brings forth much fruit only by falling into the earth and dying.

God honors those who seek to honor him.

The Greeks must have been baffled. What has this speech of Jesus' got to do with their request to see him?

But consider those Greeks. They accord Jesus rock star status. They don't even ask to talk to the great man. They want only to see him. And they don't dare come to Jesus directly. They just approach one of his friends, Philip, and they call Philip "Kyrie," that is to say, "Lord." Even Lady Gaga's groupies wouldn't call one of her friends, "Lord," would they?

Jesus' response helps those Greeks to see him—the true Lord, not the rock star the Greeks were looking for. The true Lord did not come to get status and power. He came to lose his life, to fall and die, like a grain of wheat.

The point is made emphatically at the end of Jesus' response to the Greeks. He ends with a prayer: "Father," he prays, "glorify your name." Jesus, the true Lord and not the rock star, came to seek God's glory. He did not come to seek not his own.

The final part of the lesson for the Greeks, and for us, comes in God's response to Jesus' prayer. God honors Jesus by answering his prayer out loud: "I have glorified My name, and I will glorify it again!"

"This voice didn't come for my sake, but for yours," Jesus tells the awed bystanders. God's voice came to finish the lesson: God honors those who seek to honor him.

True glory lies not in rock star status, then, but, on the contrary, in being willing to fall and die like a grain of wheat. It lies in being willing to let go, to lose one's life in this world in love for the glory of God's name

And so the Greeks do get what they asked for. In the response of Jesus to them, they, and we, see the true Lord, and with the true Lord the pattern for racing for glory in our lives, too. Glory, glory, hallelujah!

I Heart God Laugh Reflection # 6 The "Prayer Process" in Matthew Kelly's I Heard God Laugh begins with gratitude. There are reasons to begin prayer with gratitude that involve orienting ourselves rightly toward God and resisting unhelpful attitudes in ourselves. First, to begin with gratitude gives what is due to God. It is easy to forget in the hum of daily life that all things in creation – including ourselves – depend for their existence on God. Every experience we have and every relationship we enjoy is ultimately initiated and sustained by God. For this reason, Scripture provides abundant models for the expression of gratitude; from the Psalms (songs of thanksgiving make up one of the major genres of psalms) to the letters of Paul, who exhorted his readers repeatedly to be grateful. Additionally, humans have what psychologists describe as a negativity bias: negative events or thoughts tend to have a more significant impact on us than positive ones. To begin with gratitude, then, orients our prayer from the start so that our relationship with God does not turn into another opportunity to dwell on the negative. We begin with thankfulness before we turn our prayer toward introspection.

Fifth Sunday of Lent

Jeremiah 31:31-34; Psalm 51; Hebrews 5:7-9; John 12:20-33

It's so easy to remain aloof, unattached, and uninvolved. We see problems and needs on all sides, but too often we do not see them as our problems and our needs. We rationalize these as God's concern, not ours

Today's readings speak of covenant relationships. People relate to God by relating to one another. To worship God is to meet the needs of God's people. God's concern is our concern.

Jeremiah's message of hope in today's first reading was originally addressed to the northern kingdom of Israel during the time of national revival -- around 624 B.C. The prophet believed things had gotten so bad that only Yahweh's intervention could save the day. Yahweh would bring about a profound interior change among the people. The change would result from God's intention to forgive and forget human sinfulness. Jeremiah announced people's sinfulness and God's willingness to forgive. Jeremiah made God's problem his problem.

The author of Hebrews discusses the high priesthood of Jesus. As high priest, Jesus represents people before God and intercedes for them. Jesus makes God's problem (salvation) his problem, despite pain, frustration, and death.

For John, the word "hour" embraces the entire process of crucifixion, resurrection, and ascension. Jesus is willing to lay down his life. This moment, however, is also a temptation for Jesus to do his own will rather than God's. Jesus learns in suffering that accepting the hour will result in exaltation, making God's concern that of the Son, also.

Response to these readings means examining our relationships in our families, neighborhoods, parishes, and at work. If we are on good terms with these people, we are on good terms with God. If those around us are hurting, then God is concerned and so must we be. Like Jesus and Jeremiah, we are tempted to run from this pain. Like them we must reject temptation and embrace the needs and hurts of all, being one then with God and the Church.
