I HEARD GOD LAUGH # 8 Reflection: The third step in the "Prayer Process" in Matthew Kelly's I Heard God Laugh is "significant moments": a reflection on how God communicates to us through the events of our lives. A lamentable outcome of our culture's attitude toward the supernatural is that we are pressured to live lives of "practical atheism", or living as if God is not real while professing that He is, even while intellectually affirming His reality. When we live this way, we are blind toward God's work in the world. As Catholics, we believe that the created world is infused with God's action and God's intention, and these actions and intentions are not only reflected in major world events, or the influences of the great human powers and principalities. God also acts in our own moments, and it often takes an act of intentional reflection to see the hand of God at work. This step invites us to draw connections between our experiences and God's messages to us. Through this contemplation, we resist a worldview that dissolves the links between God and our lives.

Fifth Sunday of Easter

Acts 9:26-31; Psalm 22; 1 John 3:18-24; John 15:1-8

The word "Christian" generally brings warmth and good feeling to members of our Church. There are memories of first Communion and confirmation, there is commitment in adulthood to the sharing of the faith that was so generously given to us. Today's readings reflect the obligations inherent in the reception of baptism. Christianity demands productivity.

The passage from Acts shows how the Jerusalem community found it difficult to imagine that Saul had actually become a Christian. Saul's vision of the risen Lord led to his fearless proclamation of the Christian message in Damascus. The persecutor became a productive believer.

In the second reading the author of First John accentuates the positive. He points out that love must show itself in action. The community will receive from God whatever they ask because they are keeping God's commandments and doing what is pleasing in God's sight. The Christian is motivated by two realities: Jesus' divine sonship and the family relationship of all believers because of that sonship.

As the real vine, Jesus brings true life from God. The failure to bear fruit is the failure to share in divine life. Sharing in the vine is a commitment to give to others. The Christian's response is to live in Jesus and hence to be productive. To not live in Christ is to be a withered branch.

The Christian life is practical. In loving ourselves, our neighbors, and our God, we profess that God is love. In reaching out to the oppressed, we announce that God is the champion of the poor. In promoting honesty in government, we proclaim that God is the God of justice. In comforting the sorrowful, we state that God is the source of all consolation.

Each of these actions springs from baptism. Only those willing to live out the implications of baptism truly merit the title of Christian.
