

Shame and the Lord

In the <u>Gospel</u> reading, Jairus wades fearlessly into the crowd around Jesus and interrupts what Jesus is doing.

Jairus is an important person, an official of the synagogue; and his twelve-year old daughter is dangerously sick. He believes that Jesus could heal his daughter, but only if he comes right away. And so he urges Jesus to drop everything else and come *now*.

And Jesus does turn immediately to go with Jairus. But then Jairus's interruption of Jesus is itself interrupted. Jesus stops dead and demands to know who touched him.

Who touched you? his disciples say in disbelief. *Everybody* touched you! You are in the middle of a big crowd pressing all around you.

But, as we know, there was someone who touched Jesus in a special way. She was a woman who had had an issue of blood for twelve years, just as many years as Jairus had had a daughter.

Under Mosaic law, that woman was unclean all those years. And anyone who touched her became unclean too. In fact, anyone who even touched anything she sat on or slept on became unclean. The woman had spent all her money on doctors to try to stop the issue of blood, but the doctors had only made her worse.

So she was poor, outcast, and scared of being noticed. Unlike Jairus, she didn't dare interrupt Jesus to press her own concerns on him. And now she had added this dreadful thing to all the other bad things about her: she had touched the Lord himself—and so, she must have thought, she had made even Jesus unclean.

No wonder she was trembling when Jesus called her out, and she had to face him. Shame such as hers makes a person desperate to be invisible.

Unlike Jairus, this woman in her great need had not been willing to put herself forward. But she was so desperate to be healed that she was willing to be shamed, no-account, and invisible. She accepted being unnoticed and unimportant as long as she could be healed.

But Jesus was not willing to tolerate her own estimation of herself. He made the official of the synagogue wait for *her*. "Daughter," Jesus says to her, "your faith has saved you."

In that one word, 'daughter,' Jesus healed her shame as well as her blood-flow. He showed her and all the crowd around her that she was to him what Jairus's daughter was to Jairus.

And so Jairus was not the only one who cared for his daughter on that day. Eleonore Stump

<u>VOCATION CORNER</u>"When I was 15, my father died suddenly; it's a low point in my life, but also a turning point. My mom, who had converted to Catholicism several years earlier, encouraged me to speak to our parish priest. I quickly saw a transformation within myself and began to think, "If God is helping me through this Catholic priest, there must be something to this Catholic Church." After my confirmation, the Lord said to me in prayer, "Anthony, you see what I've done for you through the priesthood; now go and do likewise." I was ordained in June 2018 and I wake up every morning thanking God for allowing me to be his servant.

Thirteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time – 27 June 2021

Wisdom 1:13-15; 2:23-24. Psalm 30:2, 4, 5-6, 11, 12, 13. 2 Corinthians 8:7, 9, 13-15. Mark 5:21-43

Today's Scripture addresses human concern about being different. God is shown as the involved partner inviting humans to risk belief even in the face of conflicting values and pressure from peers. The Book of Wisdom addresses the believer's call to be different. Jews living in the first century B.C. faced a predicament: fidelity to the God of Israel even while living in the midst of cosmopolitan Alexandria. Recognition of God's sovereignty makes us different, but such recognition makes immortality possible.

The psalm extols God for delivering the psalmist from suffering and distress. The psalmist requests help and God grants him liberation. God heals him and brings him up from the nether world. In verses 4 and 5 the author cannot contain his joy, he is able to dance again.

Mark speaks today about the primacy of faith. Jairus falls at the feet of Jesus and appeals on behalf of his daughter. When Jairus hears that his daughter is dead he must believe on an even higher level -

- that the Lord is able to raise the dead: "Do not fear, only believe" (Mark 5:36). The people proclaim the presence of death by their wailing; Jesus prepares Jairus to announce the presence of life. Mark used this story to encourage belief within his community -- a community that was struggling to recognize the risen Lord as still present and powerful in their midst.

The ongoing task of believers does not change. We are bombarded each day with conflicting values like, "Only pleasure will really satisfy us," "Pursuit of self is the only genuinely fulfilling enterprise," "Patience is weakness," and "Charity has its limits." Jesus challenges us to be different -- to accept him and to live our Christian faith wholeheartedly.

Wisdom 1:13-15; 2:23-24. Psalm 30:2, 4, 5-6, 11, 12, 13. 2 Corinthians 8:7, 9, 13-15. Mark 5:21-43.

Fear and Faith. Two stories today told by Saint Mark. Both start in fear. Fear by the woman touching Jesus' cloak and making him unclean. Fear by Jairus over his dying daughter, who regrettably dies before Jesus gets to her. Jesus words to both: faith saves; have faith.

- What am willing to do in faith to get some needed action, some blessed relief?
- ♦ How can I boldly be about asking God for what I (think I) need?
- How can I comfort someone facing the death of one they love?

Ezekiel 2:2-5. Psalm 123:1-2, 2, 3-4. 2 Corinthians 12:7-10. Mark 6:1-6.
