Shepherding

The Lord is my Shepherd, <u>Psalm 23</u> says, but there are human shepherds, too.

In the <u>First Reading</u> God thunders against the human shepherds who are failures at shepherding. Who are these miserable shepherds, these failures, with whom God is so indignant? Well, you can tell who they are by what God is angry at in them. They are the human beings who have not cared for the sheep, and those sheep are God's people.

Well, what did the shepherds fail to do when they failed to care for the sheep?

They didn't help the sheep get nurture; they drove the sheep away. They led the sheep in wrong directions. They scattered the sheep, so that instead of being one flock, the sheep were divided against each other into diverse small groups.

So think about it this way.

Do you lust for someone who is not your spouse? Do you think you are caring for one of God's children when you do? Do you smoke and overeat? What impact do your bad habits have on God's children? Is there no one of God's people who will grieve over you when you get sick? Do you laze around and waste your gifts by doing nothing? Do you spend your time on foolish, frivolous things that help nobody? Do you think you are caring for God's people when you do? Do you gossip and undermine the reputation of others? Do you sow discord in your neighborhood, in your church, in your family? Are you a divisive presence in your community? Do you think you are caring for God's children when you are?

Surely no one of us is so benighted as to suppose that God's thundering against miserable shepherds is meant only for priests who aren't good enough. That thundering is a warning for each one of us. Every person has many of God's children in his care. The woman who empties your trash at work, the child in the row behind you who kicks your seat on the plane, the annoying non-stop talker at your dinner table, your old and highly inadequate mother, your very imperfect spouse—each of these is one of God's children, and each of them is in your care—a little or maybe even a lot.

All these are people that we ourselves shepherd—always with our Shepherd, whose grace we need to do it well.

Let us be careful not to be miserable shepherds for him. ----Eleonore Stump



<u>VOCATION CORNER</u> Mark's Gospel recounts the return of the Twelve, having been sent two by two, without money, food nor second tunic. He encourages them to rest awhile. Jesus demonstrates the value of taking some quiet time to reflect on all the activity in one's life. It is in this reflection that a young person can "hear" the call of God and what their true vocation in life is. Try this week to find some quiet time to "listen for" the Lord's call.

Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time – 18 July 2021

Jeremiah 23:1-6; Psalm 23; Ephesians 2:13-18; Mark 6:30-34

If I see myself as the central focus of the world and if everything's worth is measured only according to my personal gain, then my vision is poor. If we fall into this kind of selfish attitude then others are not people but things intended to satisfy needs or pleasures.

Today's readings tell us that self cannot be the exclusive condition for relationships. The shepherd is the model showing us that personal growth comes from communal concern.

In the ancient Near East, the titles "king" and "shepherd" were nearly synonymous. The image of shepherd captured the ideal relationship between a head of state and his subjects. The style was one of providing and caring for others. The kings of Israel and Judah generally did not measure up to this lofty ideal. Jeremiah illustrates Yahweh as a shepherd/king. The Lord brings home the exiles and appoints worthy shepherds. He will raise up a Davidic king who will "execute justice and righteousness in the land" (Jeremiah 23:5).

The psalmist uses action verbs to define pastoral concern: giving repose, leads, refreshment, and guidance. Pastures and waters evoke a God who is provider and sustainer. The shepherd's rod defends, and his staff guides. The sheep are without fear.

The gospel passage is Mark's prelude to the feeding of the five thousand (Mark 6:34-44). Jesus sees that the crowds need rest. Mark links Jesus' compassion to Yahweh's care of the Israelites during their desert wandering. For Mark it is clear that Jesus, having perceived the need, immediately prepares to respond by teaching and subsequently multiplying the loaves and the fish. The needs of the others must have struck a chord in Jesus, and such needs must do the same for us. Each of us is called to provide pastures and waters for one another.
