Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time – 25 July 2021

2 Kings 4:42-44; Psalm 145; Ephesians 4:1-6; John 6:1-15

Signs are all around us. There are signs of affection from loved ones, tokens of appreciation from the grateful, pats on the back from well-wishers. We all too easily become immune to signs, failing to recognize their deeper meaning.

This weekend's sacred Scriptures teach us that signs are personal demonstrations of God's concern. Signs, by their very nature, evoke awe, gratitude, and praise. Signs are actually a reflection of God's involvement in our living.

Elisha was a great prophetic figure of the ninth century B.C., a successor of the mighty Elijah (see 2 Kings 2:1-18). While Elijah was a solitary figure, Elisha was a colorful leader with a dynamic personality. Elisha had twenty barley loaves and a group of a hundred to feed. In spite of the disproportion between supply and demand, there was food remaining. The leftovers demonstrate Elijah's concern and the fidelity of the Lord's word.

Psalm 145 invites all of creation to extol the Lord for his ongoing concern. This call to praise presupposes that God's actions are individual exhibitions of profound love. The passage focuses on God's open hand, a gesture that satisfies the desires of all living things. The Lord is near to all; Yahweh is an involved Creator/God.

Like Moses on Mount Sinai, Jesus is on the mountain. Like Moses, who is concerned about the availability of food, Jesus must entertain Philip's observation about insufficient funds to buy food for so many. Yet the multitude fails to see Jesus as the sign of God's presence. Instead, they see only the miracle and want to make him king.

Who are the people we take for granted and hence who are our possible "sign" people? Our loved ones, our friends, our public officials, and many others reveal the presence of a concerned God.

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Hard Work Requires Rest. After all the traveling light last week to do ministry, Jesus tries to take the apostles away for some rest. But the people see them go, discover where they are headed, and get there first. Oh, my! So, Jesus ministers to them by teaching many things. After we work hard at mercy works, sometimes we can rest. Sometimes not.

- 1. How can I find some rest from work in the quiet place of prayer?
- 2. How can my restful prayer strengthen me to do more?
- 3. What will I do next?

Feeding the Hungry

The prophet Elisha fed a hundred people with twenty barley loaves, and there were leftovers. Jesus fed about five thousand with five barley loaves and a couple of dried fish, and there were leftovers. That is God's desire for us: everyone should find food in abundance.

Today's reality is different. Every three days more people die from malnutrition and disease than from the bombing of Hiroshima, and every year more people die from preventable hunger than died in the Holocaust, even though we grow enough grain in the world to provide every man, woman, and child with a satisfactory diet of 3000 calories.

The Second Reading from Ephesians tells us to "make every effort to preserve the unity which has the Spirit as its origin and peace as its binding force." The problem with the world is its fragmentation; it lacks unity and peace.

The problem is not with God's providence, for God has provided us with enough food for everyone, and then some.

The problem is the divisions in the world that prevent food from getting to people or keep people away from the food.

God has given blessings to the world: if only we could learn to use those blessings for the benefit of all.

Since there are so many people in this world afflicted with hunger, this sacred Council urges all, both individuals and governments, to remember the saying of the Fathers: "Feed the man dying of hunger, because if you have not fed him you have killed him." Vatican II, Constitution on the Church in the Modern World,
