Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time – 08 August 2021

1 Kings 19:4-8. Psalm 34:2-3, 4-5, 6-7, 8-9. Ephesians 4:30–5:2. John 6:41-51.

Origins and roots are important. People get to know us by our backgrounds. Our names, physical appearances, and family histories tell about who we are. The readings today focus on origins. They suggest that roots condition our ways of thinking and acting.

In the ninth century B.C. the Israelite prophet Elijah defeated Queen Jezebel's pagan prophets on Mount Carmel. She was determined therefore to get rid of Elijah. He fled to his roots at Mount Horeb or Sinai. The destination was no accident. At Horeb the people of Israel discovered their destiny as God's people. Elijah entered into the experience of his ancestors and thus gained strength to speak out on behalf of God.

The author of Ephesians offers a Christian way of life based on God's action in Jesus. In this outlook, an injury to one's neighbor is an injury to the Holy Spirit dwelling in the neighbor. In making his recommendations for forgiveness and compassion, the author urges Christians to reassess their roots. Since the Christian identifies with God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit, the Christian must act in a way that reveals such a grandiose pedigree.

Bread continues to be a symbol of the person and work of Jesus in today's gospel. As bread sustains life, Jesus will sustain all who approach him in faith. Jesus seems to possess merely human credentials as Joseph's son, but Jesus is actually the manifestation of God. To acknowledge Jesus as the living bread is the ultimate expression of God's love in Christ's death and glorification.

We reach out to the homeless because we see God's image in all people. We reject violence as a settlement for conflict because we accept the gospel of the Prince of Peace. We uphold our neighbor's reputation because that person is a brother or sister in Christ. We do all of these Christian works because we have our roots in the divine origin of Creator. Redeemer, and Sanctifier.

Becoming Food

The prophet Elijah is weak from hunger, but the angel of the Lord feeds him with a hearth cake and a jug of water. Elijah is no longer hungry, but what is more important, "strengthened by that food, he walked forty days and forty nights." There was work to do, a journey to be made, and the food made it possible.

When Jesus talks about the bread that he is giving, he compares it to manna, which performed a role similar to Elijah's food: it enabled a journey to take place (out of the desert and into the promised land). So it is obvious that Jesus intends the bread of life not just to satisfy hunger but also to make possible the accomplishment of a task, the completion of a journey.

In one sense, this journey is on the road to salvation: "bring us to our promised inheritance," we pray in the opening prayer. Jesus has to have something else in mind also, because he talks about not just feeding but also becoming food: "the bread I will give is my flesh, for the life of the world."

We are to sacrifice ourselves, as Jesus on the cross and in the Eucharist, for the sake of the poor ones, the lowly and the afflicted. The Eucharist challenges us to become their food, so that they may complete the journey "to the mountain of God."

According to the Christian message, man's relationship to his neighbor is bound up with his relationship to God; his response to the love of God, saving us through Christ, is shown to be effective in his love and service of men. Christian love of neighbor and justice cannot be separated.

For love implies an absolute demand for justice, namely a recognition of the dignity and rights of one's neighbor. Justice attains its inner fullness only in love. Because every man is truly a visible image of the invisible God and a brother of Christ, the Christian finds in every man God himself and God's absolute demand for justice and love.
