19^h Sunday in Ordinary Time, August 7, 2022

Wisdom 18:6-9; Psalm 33; Hebrews 11:1-2,8-19; Luke 12:32-48

Our Christian tradition teaches us about priorities in living: God, love of neighbor as yourself, justice and truth, and so forth. We all know, however, that in the practical realm of everyday life, values are rarely ordered with such precision and clarity. Actually living the values we know to be right requires a harmony of mind and heart, spirit and flesh. Today's readings challenge our priorities, our hierarchy of values.

The gospel passage from Luke clearly identifies the kingdom of God as our ultimate concern. The kingdom does not result from human ingenuity; it is a pure gift of God. The classic measure of priorities is stated by Jesus, "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Luke 12:34).

"Thy kingdom come" is an unrelenting prayer and desire for those who choose the kingdom in mind and heart. The true believer is constantly prepared with belt fastened and lamp burning. To doze off is to abandon the ultimate quest.

Jesus speaks of priorities in the lives of Church leaders. People in roles of leadership sometime choose power over justice as their ultimate concern. The leader is first of all servant. Jesus states the leader's responsibility in this way, "From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required; and from the one to whom much has been entrusted, even more will be demanded" (Luke 12:48).

The Hebrews passage today, the second reading, presents Abraham and Sarah as examples of responsible servant-leaders who are uncompromising in their values. The lesson we learn from these giants of faith is that God's promises will always be fulfilled, but perhaps not in our time for our viewing. "Faith is assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1).

The world focuses priorities and values around power, success, popularity, and pleasure. Today's Scriptures help us to measure these priorities and values against the ultimate concerns of the kingdom.

Anticipating the Kingdom

We are a people who have been promised inheritance and life; we are "heirs of the same promise" made to Abraham. We have, therefore, put our hope in God: "our soul waits for the Lord," who will come when we least expect him.

But our waiting is not passive; we are to keep our belts tightened and our lamps burning "like men awaiting their master's return from a wedding." So when the command comes to "be watchful and ready," it means for us to go about "putting into effect with one accord the divine institution."

Waiting for Christ to return means working for the coming of the Kingdom of God. It means combatting poverty; ending the hatreds that divide us; establishing peace among individuals, within families, in society, and among the nations of the world; curbing the pride that causes us to become confrontational with God and with each other; building social structures that respect the dignity of individual humans.

Abraham obeyed when he was called: let us obey the call to prepare the world for the coming of Christ.

The church well knows that no temporal achievement is to be identified with the kingdom of God, but that all such achievements simply reflect and in a sense anticipate the glory of the kingdom, the kingdom which we await at the end of history when the Lord will come again. But that expectation can never be an excuse for lack of concern for people in their concrete personal situations and in their social, national and international life.
